Minister's Musings

"When Chekhov saw the long winter, he saw a winter bleak and dark and bereft of hope. Yet we know that winter is just another step in the cycle of life. But standing here among the people of Punxsutawney and basking in the warmth of their hearths and hearts, I couldn't imagine a better fate than a long and lustrous winter."

Oh, it's almost time for Groundhog Day.

Each February 2 we ask Punxsutawney Phil to emerge from his slumber. If he sees his shadow, there's six more weeks of fiscal cliff negotiations. Sorry, winter. Six more weeks of

winter. And if the skies are grey that February Day, then spring is indeed on the way.

Perhaps more interesting than the day itself is the movie of the same name. In it Bill Murray experiences the same day over and over again. He finally wises up to the events and uses it ... well I won't spoil it for you. But check it out sometime.

It turns out church life can be a bit like Groundhog Day. Basically each year, we get through the slog of January and dig ourselves out of the snow and ice. Come February and we are ready to see what awaits us. Our Punxsutawney Phil is more like a Pledgecard Phil – and some years we have grey, and some years we have sunshine.

Even better, with Bill Murray-level accuracy, I can predict how certain church events will go. We routinely ask people to give their feedback about the church and what they like, why they come, etc. Most people like the community feeling, the chance to explore religious beliefs, and a church that works on justice.

Yet there's something important about having the conversation. This year, like we do lots of different ways in most years, we will ask you to give the church feedback about why you became a Unitarian Universalist. Believe me when I tell you that we ask the question **NOT** as a pro forma way of getting you to pledge, or to justify work we already plan to do.

We ask your opinions because the church isn't a building; the church is *you*. It's not necessarily that we need to hear what people want. We've heard that lots of times and the essence of that lesson is ingrained in our leaders' minds. What we need is to hear and re-hear the stories – how did the church change you? What were you looking for when you found us, and what did you find? What do you want others to find?

The single most spectacular part of my job happens when I get to hear stories about people's lives. It's not about where they end up, or seeing the final product, but about the journey they've taken. That's where we learn the lessons of life. So this spring, we will once again ask you to tell your story. We'll ask you to do it in a few different ways, and to tell different versions. I encourage you to share with us, even if you have before. Dig down deep in the wells of your memories and share them with us. Our church will be better, brighter, warmer, more hopeful for it.

There is no repetition found in the telling of our life stories, for we all experience life differently. Out of those stories comes rebirth and renewal, the spring of our lives.

RESPECT was founded over ten years ago to address bullying in schools. RESPECT programs consist of educational theatre presentations paired with panel or group discussions led by community professionals and actor-educators. With just a small staff of administrators and educators, RESPECT reaches approximately 40,000 students a year, with programs appropriate for preschool through high school, as well as training for parents, educators, and community members. RESPECT's goals are to decrease the acts of bullying, and even more important, to empower kids and adults who may be on the sidelines to take action and stand up to help a target. RESPECT collaborates with numerous organizations throughout Nebraska and maintains both a Community Advisory Committee and a Student Advisory Committee to ensure that their content stays relevant.



Dealing with an Icy Parking Lot

Join Our Community Garden!

Enjoying vegetables and fruits picked fresh from the garden is a blessing of summer and an excellent way to maintain a healthy diet.

If you don't have space for your own garden or would like to enjoy gardening with a community of urban farmers who practice the principles of organic and sustainable gardening, Second Unitarian's Community Garden is a great solution!

Interested? Then mark your calendar for **Saturday**, **February 2**, **11:00 a.m.** to attend our Community Garden Planning Meeting in the downstairs worship area.

Our garden is on the north side of the church. Each of the 14 plots is about 2 feet by 4 feet – big enough for a few tomato plants, peppers, lettuce, cabbages, pole beans, herbs, or hill cucumbers. Watering is easy with a soaker hose under each plot. Gardeners sign up for a week to turn on the water to all plots if it doesn't rain. Major responsibilities for each gardener include pulling weeds and picking produce when ripe. Last year a couple of plots were abandoned, and the remaining gardeners had to maintain them.

The \$10 fee for each plot helps defray costs for water and supplies. Gardeners buy their own seeds. We have some shared tools and plan a couple of group workdays to prepare and close down the garden. Plots are assigned on a first-come, first-served basis with priority given to gardeners who had a plot last year and/or who attend the February 2 meeting. Second Circle "Under Construction"

There will be no Second Circle on Sunday mornings in February. The Sunday morning program for teens is "under construction" as we assess what the needs are and whether Sunday morning is the best time to meet those needs.

Approximately 15 years ago, the joint First and Second Unitarian Church youth group was formed when both churches had just a few teens. We realized that what they needed most was each other, so we brought them together in the joint youth program on Wednesday evenings at First Unitarian. This has been a joint venture between the two churches. Teen ministry happened on Wednesday evenings instead of Sunday mornings. On Sundays, some teens chose to attend services, help with the younger children downstairs, or sleep in. After a while though, some teens started to congregate in the foyer during church services because their need at that time was to be with their friends. So we decided to start "Second Circle" as a Sunday morning option for teens to meet more intimately with their peers in a covenant group-type program.

Those teens who first congregated in the foyer have grown now, and again we have teens whose needs differ from their predecessors. We are taking some time to assess what these needs are and how we can best meet them. In January, we facilitated a showing and discussion for teens and parents of the movie "Crash." We continue to ponder other options for the future and will keep you posted on the "construction" as we progress. Even if your home is smoke-free, your family could still be at risk for lung cancer. Breathe even easier knowing how to take action to protect your family!

If you have never tested for radon, start now! It's never too late to protect your family's health. Exposure to radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer and contributes to more than 20,000 lung cancer deaths in the U.S. each year (according to the EPA).

Radon, a gas created by the natural decay of uranium, is found in almost all soil and seeps in through cracks and holes in your home's foundation. It is odorless, colorless, and tasteless, so you would never know it was there.

You can, however, pick up a radon test at local retail stores for just \$15 – 30. Nebraska Health and Human Services says you should test once every two years. For more information, you can call the radon hotline at 1-800-334-9491.
