Minister's Musings

I've spent much of the last few months reading about ministry in multicultural settings – how worship, education, pastoral care are affected when one intentionally creates a multicultural ministry. My head has been swirling – with the possibilities as well as the perils. One of the most useful readings that I have found has been a lecture from the Reverend Rob Hardies, of All Souls Unitarian Church in Washington, D.C.

Rob asks, "Are We Willing to be Changed by What We Started?" (Found at: http://www.uuworld.org/ideas/articles/188510.shtml)

At his congregation in D.C., they have decided to become an intentionally multiracial, multicultural congregation that celebrates and emphasizes diversity – diversity of race, class, ethnicity, ability, gender and sexual identities and expressions of gender. This intentional diversity creates a church community so expansive, it begins to feel like the images of heaven we all hear

about.

Yet, in order to create this congregation where *All Souls* are welcomed and embraced, they understood they had to make intentional changes to their church. Rob's advice, which is shared by other leaders of multicultural ministries, is to "Put the vision at the center and measure the progress."

As part of their transformation to a truly Beloved Community, All Souls asks itself (and encourages us to ask ourselves):

- With whom are you in relationship and solidarity?
- Who's on your staff?
- Who's up front in the pulpit?
- What are you singing? And how?
- What stories are you telling?

At the end of his lecture, Rev. Hardies says, "We stand for a commanding and transforming love that embraces all souls." This, my church community, is why I think we ought to look at our congregation and decide to create a ministry that is intentionally multicultural.

In our world, there are many people who long for a religious home that offers more than blind faith and more than division and separation. Many of us are here at Second Unitarian because we stand for a transforming love that embraces all souls – and we want to share that message with others. And yet the difficulty is that in order for this message to be truly effective, we must be willing to be changed by what we started.

Often, we go to church looking for comfort, looking for solace, looking for ourselves. Creating a ministry that is intentionally multicultural means that we will be in relationship with people from different backgrounds, with different life experiences. Richer and poorer, louder and softer, stronger and weaker – all sorts of different people will share our pews and our sanctuary. A multicultural ministry does not mean one in which we lose our culture – it means one where we lift up cultures different than our own.

The purpose, the call of a multicultural ministry is not simply to have more people, or to look diverse to any casual observer. As Rev. Hardies points out, "You'd be surprised, when you ask them, of the hidden diversity in your congregation. We are more diverse than we think, if we allow people to share that with us." No, the purpose of this intentionally multicultural ministry is to create a vision and a community of a world so inclusive, so broad that it includes the meaningful stories and experiences of all people – not a particular subgroup.

Unitarian Universalism spoke to each and every person who has joined this church – and often our members feel as though it saved them and empowered them to live a religious life that represented their authentic selves. And now we are called to share that religion with all of the people of the world so that they, too, might feel that compassion and love and transformation.

May it be so,

Share the Plate for January: Together, Inc. of Omaha

One half of Second Unitarian's offering received in January will go to Together, Inc. of Omaha. Together, Inc. (togetheromaha.org) is a local non-profit, homelessness prevention agency. Together, Inc. assists people in need by providing services, education to inspire change, and collaboration to sustain that change. Clients are working families, single parents, and others in the Omaha area who struggle to put food on the table. Together, Inc. provides boxes of food, counseling for social services, help with rent payments, bus tickets to work, and computer access for resumes and email. They also make referrals for specialized help.

Unlike other programs that provide housing/rental assistance Together, Inc. offers help with repairs to allow people to remain in their home. They also can provide help with paying utility bills, clothing, and furniture.

Together, Inc. does not turn anyone away. In 2010 they provided more than 57,000 services to more than 25,000 residents of the Omaha area. Financial donations to Together, Inc. are crucial in this time of cutbacks and restrictions on government funding.

The Hour Exchange:

Unmet Needs and Unused Resources

When life became difficult for my aging mother, the neighbors responded. They mowed her lawn and shoveled snow. Mom had made comforters for them and had watched their kids. These connections enriched everyone's lives. The process of connecting was natural and almost easy, but it isn't always that way.

This was a topic in Caring Committee meetings: There are painful unmet needs that others would be happy to meet if they only knew! How do we make connections?

After one discussion, Rev. Scott gave me the name of church member Don Mundy. Don had viewed a segment about Service Exchanges on "Fixing the Future" on PBS and was excited about the concept.

Don told me about HourWorld, a service exchange group. **Service exchanges, or hour exchanges, match needs and resources.** Members exchange hours of service time, e.g. teaching, housework, medical care, transportation, furnace repair, etc. This can create great socio-economic power that benefits the elderly, low income groups and immigrants. Also, the hour exchanges are not taxed!

That connection generated another: The folks at HourWorld were traveling across the country to meet with hour exchanges and agreed to meet with us! A week later, Don, Tina LaBellarte, and I were eating spaghetti with them. They exchanged their expert knowledge for a night's lodging and spoke of houses that were built and friendships made through the power of hour exchanges. They told us the next step is to meet and share the excitement.

Here's that next step: Join us Sunday, January 29, at 4 p.m. in the sanctuary for a Forum about our own Hour Exchange. If you are interested in learning more, please come to listen and share.

Interior Maintenance the Focus of Church Cleanup

Managing Snow & Ice at Church

When conditions are icy, it can be difficult entering the church parking lot via the north driveway. Avoid this problem by entering via the south driveway.



In the Cold of Winter...

Think about the Community Garden

Thinking about fresh vegetables is a great way to forget about winter's chilly blasts. Mark your calendar for **Saturday**, **January 28**. Anyone who wants a garden plot or has ideas for our organic Community Garden is welcome to meet at **10 a.m.** at church.

Our garden is on the north side of the church. Each plot is about 2 feet by 4 feet – big enough for a few tomato plants, peppers, lettuce, cabbages, pole beans, herbs, or hill cucumbers. We had all of these plus flowers, pumpkins, and cantaloupes in our 2011 garden. Watering is easy with a soaker hose under each plot. Gardeners sign up for a week to turn on the water to all plots if it doesn't rain.

Major responsibilities for each gardener include pulling weeds and picking produce when ripe. The neighborhood patrol cat, Ashley, chases away rabbits.

Plots are assigned on first come, first served basis. If you want a plot but cannot attend the meeting, notify Vicki Pratt. \$10 for each plot helps defray costs for water and supplies. Other expenses are paid from the Social Action Fund. This money comes from sales of fair trade coffees, teas, and chocolates. Gardeners buy their own seeds. We have some shared tools and plan a couple of group work days to prepare and close down the garden.



Second Unitarian's Vote on Study Action Issues

Second Unitarian participates in the Unitarian Universalists Association's Social Witness process. This is how our denomination arrives at consensus on articulating our position on major issues. It's called the Social Witness process because we, as congregations, as well as the national office, call attention to social and economic inequities.

Congregations mark their ballot to place up to five issues on the General Assembly agenda for voting by delegates. Delegates select one of the five as the new Study/Action Issue. After three years of congregational study and feedback, the Commission on Social Witness drafts a Statement of Conscience and actions. The Statement of Conscience is our position on the issue.

Congregations then mark their ballot for whether to place the wording for this Statement of Conscience on the General Assembly agenda. Delegates vote whether to adopt the Statement of Conscience.

For the balloting to be valid, 25% of congregations must participate in the voting process. Second Unitarian will decide how to fill out our ballot during a **Forum on Sunday**, **January 22**, at **12:45 p.m**.
