Minister's Musings

At least once a day, I need to go to our church's website. So I open a browser and begin to type www.second... And that's when I remember that our website has changed. It's now www.2uomaha.org. Sure, I could go to our old website and simply click the link at the top of the page to our new site – but instead, I try to train myself to go with the change, to work with our new system.

That's how change goes – it's hard to break old habits and patterns and so we either fail to adapt to the change, or we must intentionally train ourselves to do something different. Whether it involves a website, or a way of relating to someone – whatever change we hope to make in our lives has to be intentional and practiced over and over.

I know someone who has set a goal to quit smoking and I can only imagine the amount of change that will be required. Habits get ingrained into our lives and can be almost second nature. Shaking that up requires our mind to actively seek different behavior, and it almost always affects our hearts and souls in some way.

Such is the nature of change within church life, as well. We seek new ways of building relationships, new ways of doing things and in so doing, we require ourselves to make new habits and to end old ones. Many Sunday mornings, I find myself preferring to sleep in a bit, only to recognize that our change to two services means that I have to be up and ready a bit earlier than originally. I can only imagine how much you all have had to change your schedules and mindsets to grapple with this growth.

And yet, with whatever change we make, if we continue to do it long enough, it will sink in. Old habits take forever to change – but once they do, they feel perfectly normal. But it takes that time and effort, and in the midst, things often feel disjointed or weird. And so, I am thankful to everyone who is willing to accept some change in their life – either personally or with the church.

While I often think I am okay with change, maybe even encouraging of it, I find that it's just as hard for me as it is for most people. And yet what I realize is that life is changing in so many ways that often I am more comfortable if I try to let go of control. Some days and in some ways, I am better with that than others.

Talking with some of our great volunteers in Religious Growth and Learning, I started wrestling with the concept and issue of control and surrender. While I have not totally adopted it, there seems to be some validity to the Buddhist concept of non-attachment. I find myself suffering less when I let go, somewhat.

I find that I work best not when I *detach*, completely letting go of something. Instead, I am at my best self when I work hard for something and then can let go and let the universe, the Great Mystery of life, take over. Mostly because I have found that the universe will do whatever it will, regardless of my particular views.

I'd be interested in hearing more about your thoughts on surrender, control, habit forming, and changing. I imagine there are some of you who have figured it out – so hopefully you can share some of that wisdom with me, and others. In the meantime, I will have to work on correcting myself when I falter and comforting myself, too.

Habits are hard to change, and the solace they bring comforting – but often, we can grow more when we embrace the change rather than resist it. May I – may we – find peace in change and consistency.

As Unitarian Universalists we know that our denomination is a small percentage of the total religious community, BUT should that dampen our ambitions for how we can be transformational – both internally and externally? Do you fantasize about how our congregation could have a real impact in the community and beyond? I think about this often and imagine what could be achieved if we were really clear about who we are and what we want. I'll be the first to admit that the imagining part is the easy part but our job – all of us - in the next few months is to reach clarity on this goal.

In mid-January, the board members participated in a webinar on board responsibilities that asked us to think about these very things and how we could enhance our leadership skills in these efforts. As I've mentioned before, we are working to create a succinct and clear vision as a start for this work. The webinar challenged us to articulate the legacy we, as a board, would like to have five years from now. We will be thinking carefully about that. What would you like our legacy to be?

If there is to be a legacy, we have to plan for the future and during the next few months, the board will work on a long range view. As part of our budget request for 2012-13 we have asked for funds for an initial visit from a UUA consultant. This consultant will help us, as a congregation, learn how to leverage our potential into real growth and make our mark in the community in a way that is helpful and healing.

Looking forward to taking this "trip" with you.

Share the Plate for February: Siena/Francis House

One half of Second Unitarian's offering received in February will go to Siena/Francis House.

The Siena/Francis House is Nebraska's largest shelter and is located in three facilities at 17th & Nicholas Streets in downtown Omaha. The Siena/Francis House has been providing emergency overnight shelter to men, women, and women with children for over 35 years. The Siena/Francis House also provides food to the homeless through its Meal Provider Program, clothing, and case management outreach services through its day services program. Additionally, the Siena/Francis House operates a residential addiction recovery program, aptly named "Miracles" Treatment Center.

The Siena/Francis House is independent, in that it is not affiliated with a national or religious organization, is not a United Way member agency, and does not receive annual United Way allocations or grants.

Please indicate on the sheet if you are able to host and the number of guests you can accommodate.

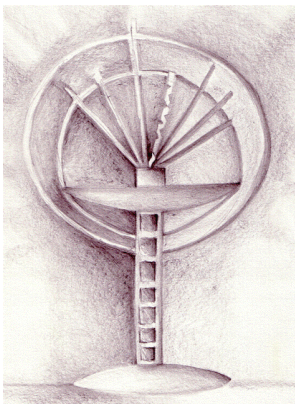

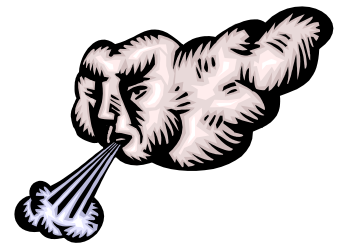

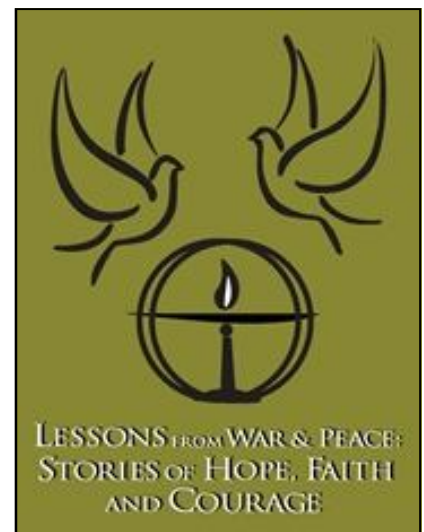

Equal Employment Ordinance

As many of you know, plans had been in place to reintroduce an amendment to Omaha's employment non-discrimination ordinance that would prohibit discrimination in the workplace based on a person's sexual orientation or gender identity. This action has now been postponed, due to a related bill that has been introduced at the state level. Legislative Bill 912 is being considered by the Judiciary Committee of Nebraska's Unicameral.

LB 912 would essentially invalidate any Nebraska city's choice to introduce an ordinance that would differ from the state's current antidiscrimination policy. And the state does not recognize the LGBT community as a protected class.

- March 18 *Seeking Solutions*
