Minister's Musings

It's here – summer, with its heat and humidity, storms and sun, flowers and festivities – it's here! And as I write this, it's only May! In a staff meeting recently, we discussed how summer had a different feel for parents vs. children. Some adults are in a place to take the summer off, but definitely not all of them. The memories of a summer vacation period make us wish for those weeks of poolsides and playtime. But alas, many of us have to work.

Strangely, that brings me around to a couple of topics. The first is that churches are still functioning strongly during the summer. Sure, we often change programming. Committees tend to meet less regularly to have a little break. But things are still happening around here. This is our first year having two Sunday morning services and attendance has been so strong that we decided to keep

that going through the summer!

Now, summer attendance sometimes slips from the usual church year (Sept-June). But this year, I am hoping you all can show up and experience some fantastic worship. We have ministers and ministry students, lay people and a big youth service – all sorts of neat worship opportunities this year. We (as a church) are definitely not taking the summer off – in any way!

June 24 will be a potluck and while some of us will be at General Assembly, the annual gathering of congregations, we hope that the rest of you will be here and have a great dinner together. Breaking bread is one of the best opportunities to connect!

Summer also brings a change to the minister's schedule. There are pros and cons to this, but the parish minister preaches far less in the summer. I'll still preach some – but we want to give others an opportunity to lend their voices to the pulpit. Each year, I am supposed to take vacation to refresh myself and study leave to learn. Last year, I wasn't so good about that – and I learned a good (but hard) lesson.

So this year, your emails may not be replied to as quickly as you're used to. You may not see me in worship as often. I will be better about taking time off – and I will also be working some over the summer. There is so much going on here at 2U that I simply can't take that much time off – we have to start planning for the fall and holidays!

When I was in elementary school, they started a program called "Year-Round School." Instead of having the summer off, students would go to school for 9 weeks and then have 2-3 weeks off all year long. I JUMPED at the chance to do this program – I can't stand to sit around for months. Therefore, it's hard for me to take off the summer and come back in August/September. I'd rather work part of the time, rest part of the time, and find a balance to life rather than swing back and forth.

As you may have heard in my sermons, balance is key to me. Part of my spirituality is centered in my (Western) understanding of Taoism. It's important to see the good and the bad, to rest and to work, to find the balance throughout all of life. I encourage you to do the same. Take some time off – but not too much. Sunday worship creates an opportunity to hear new ideas, to learn and grow, and to build community and connections. We hope you'll do that all year long!

This fall, we hope to build upon the small groups we started last year. The ones that took off were a huge success and a couple that we started didn't pan out. So this year, we hope to learn from that and to really get everyone involved in a ministry that speaks to them. Be on the lookout for more information – and be thinking of how you would like to be ministered to, and how you would like to minister!

Committee on Ministry

Authentic, Compassionate, Transformative

The Committee on Ministry works with the Minister to attend to the ministry of the church. In order to do that we have to know who we are as a community and what the community wants as a result of worshiping together on Sunday and entering into covenant with one another. Our covenant states that 'we freely explore our values and honor our diversity' for in it, lies our strength. The Committee on Ministry will have more conversations with the congregation as we discuss the ministry of the congregation and the direction we think it should take. We must be clear about who we are and how we live our Unitarian Universalist principles every day in order to be authentic.

Our covenant calls on us "to build healthy relationships by respecting our differences and assuming good intentions." It also asks us "to listen appreciatively and speak directly, honestly and compassionately." We would be a fairly dull community if we all thought the same thing and always agreed with one another. The tie that binds us is compassion for each other. We must "do our best to forgive if we hurt one another, to make amends and to reconnect in a spirit of gratitude and generosity." That compassion extends to the minister, the DRE and the office administrator. The congregation may be asked to call on that compassion to care for our minister to avoid burnout and to help keep him whole. As many of you know, Rev. McNeill did not take a summer vacation last year in preparation for two services. The congregation honored his dedication to helping the congregation grow but our minister is expected to take time off in order to rest, to study and learn, to recharge. This may require some lay-led services to fill in for him but that compassion, to help bear another's burden, is what makes our community great.

Finally, we have all heard it said that change is a constant. In order for any organism to grow, it must change. How it manages that change determines its success. When a hermit crab gets cramped in its shell, it searches around for a new one. When it finds one that it likes, it pulls its body out of the old shell and scurries to insert it into the new one. During this transition, the hermit crab is most vulnerable. So it is as a congregation searches for a new home. We must do the good work, guided by our covenant, to prepare for a new church home. This will require us to address all concerns, prepare contingencies and find a home that will meet most if not all of our needs. This will be an exciting time but may also be anxiety-provoking as well. If anyone begins to feel that anxiety creeping in, our source of solace is the covenant. Go to the MEMBERS page on our website, click on Governing Documents and you will find it. The key for all of us will be to keep our eye on the prize of a new building that will transform us from what started as a small fellowship, to a vibrant religious community that can help transform Omaha. In covenant, we must do the work to strengthen those bonds that make us a congregation that is Authentic, Compassionate and Transformative.





Tornado season is upon us again!

What if a severe storm with a possible tornado approaches our area during Sunday church service? **Do you know our tornado evacuation plan?**

The safest area of the building is in the basement. Go down either north or south stairway. Proceed to the south classrooms area (under the foyer and library areas) and stay away from the larger east-facing windows because the strong winds could blow debris through them. The windows on the west side are less

dangerous because they are protected by window wells. The restrooms, storeroom beyond the women's restroom, and kitchen are also relatively safe areas. Please stay clear of the downstairs worship area and church office which have large east-facing windows. Tornado shelter signs are posted as a reminder.

How do we tell if a severe storm is close? There is a tornado siren about two blocks away, and we have a weather radio in the kitchen that will sound a loud alarm automatically whenever the National Weather Service issues a weather warning for Douglas County.
