In part, they evaluate the ministry of our church and find ways that we can improve.

Members are **Gay Robinson Abraham**, **Pat Caffrey**, **Louisa Foster**, **Molly Kliment-Jenkins**, and **Richard Koelling**. Feel free to talk with them about how you think your ministry is going and what you'd like to see as part of the ministry of the church.

Finally, <u>ministers</u>! You probably know me by now, but just to get all of our folks on the same page – I'm entering the third year of settled ministry here. I work with our staff and volunteers to get our ministry out into the world. My wife, the **Rev. Sarah Gettie Burks**, is a chaplain at Methodist Hospital (and even has her *own* Committee on Ministry!). She volunteers at the church some, as part of her affiliation (she's an Affiliated Community Minister). Ministers who work in the community are encouraged to connect to a congregation. We were the church that sponsored her to ministry, as she went on to learn in Lincoln – so we are happy to see her ministry grow!

Planks and Slivers from the Board

I'm a little uncomfortable with the name of this newsletter item, "Planks and Slivers from the Board." I'm okay with the *planks* part, but am not too sure about giving everyone *slivers*. Slivers are bad enough when accidentally self-induced, but to dole them out intentionally is a bit much. Yet, there might be a metaphor here.

In my life away from church, I help youngsters heal and deal with illness and injuries, slivers being a common item on the warm weather injury list. Unfortunately, I have to cause some extra pain to fix the problem. Mostly, everyone understands that this pain I am causing has a purpose and everything will feel better after the procedure is finished. Avoiding the discomfort isn't an option.

A more constructive kind of discomfort is growing pain. A real medical diagnosis, this is, a real pain with a real cause. It is also a pain with a purpose. Big or small discomforts arise from the changes that go along with growing. Whether pinched feet from too small shoes or leg aches from stretching muscles, growing forces adaptations required to meet the challenges of change. And we just expect kids to do this, because growing is natural, expected, and a sign of good health. Not growing isn't even an option.

We are also growing and maturing as a church community. It's possible we might experience a twinge of growing pain. This will not come in the form of leg pain but might be an ache of loss for something familiar that isn't the same anymore. Reflect on it a moment, see it for what it is, share the feeling with your church community, and know that growth is natural, expected, and a sign of good health. Adaptations must be made to meet the challenge brought on by change. But sometimes, it's a bit uncomfortable. However, not growing isn't really an option.

So, here's to slivers and growth and the healing power of blessed community. If we do this together, it will only hurt a tiny bit.

Share the Plate for October: Tracy Iwersen Memorial Pride Players Scholarship Fund

One half of Second Unitarian's offering received in October will go to The Pride Players.

The Pride Players is a teen theatre group that uses improvisation to create songs, poetry, monologues, and skits that explore what it means to be a gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, questioning, or allied teen in Omaha. Are We A Healthy or Vulnerable Congregation?

UUA campaign consultant Dave Rickard visited Second Unitarian last spring to make an assessment of our capacity for obtaining a more accessible and functional church building. In his report he stated the following concern: "A quartile analysis showed that in 2011-2012, nine households (11%) provided 50% of the pledged amount. In my experience, such dependence on a few members is not good for the continuing financial health of the congregation."

What is Dave talking about? Are we really a vulnerable congregation?

Past Finance Committee chair Vicki Pratt did the quartile analysis for our 2012 Stewardship Campaign that is displayed in the table below. \$167,700 was pledged, so 25% (one quartile) is about \$41,900. For our congregation, the top four pledges (just under 4%) totaled \$44,500 or 26% of the total amount pledged. Obviously 4% is way below the desired 10% for a healthy congregation and even below the 5% for a vulnerable congregation. What does this mean for us? If any one of these top four pledges leaves the congregation, drastic measures may be necessary – for example, emergency cost cutting or fundraising. Some progress is being made: 13 households pledged 50% of the total, an increase from 9 last year.

That's why it's vital to the financial health of our church to raise the level of pledging by members and affiliates in the lower quartiles. That will continue to be our focus for the 2013 Stewardship Campaign.


This is the PERFECT event for "Bring a Friend Sunday" and it makes having lunch with others from church so easy!

In the summer of 2005, Zach, a 16-year-old boy from Memphis, Tennessee, wrote on his MySpace blog that he had told his parents he was gay. Within days of his coming out, his mother and father would send him to Love In Action (LIA), a fundamentalist Christian program that refers to homosexuality as an addictive behavior. His blog entries quickly spread from his friends, to the local community, to the nation through the Internet. In a remarkably short time, daily protests were organized outside the campus of LIA. "This Is What Love In Action Looks Like" documents the widely controversial and inspirational story of what The New York Times referred to as "A modern day message in a bottle."

New Church Entry Intercom System

Building & Grounds Committee members have installed an entry door intercom system at the main and lower level doors. If the door is locked, push the button and a chime will ring on the intercom handset on the Office Administrator's desk. (Intercom handsets are also being installed in the Minister's and Director of Religious Education's offices.)

When a meeting is being held downstairs and no one is in the sanctuary, we recommend that the front door be locked about 10 minutes after the meeting begins and let latecomers use the intercom to identify themselves.

To speak with the person at the door, after the chime rings, just pick up the handset and talk. Lights on the handset indicate which door station was activated.

Although the system has the capability of remotely unlocking the doors, we haven't yet purchased that upgrade.



The 2012-2013 UUA Common Read is The New Jim Crow by Michelle Alexander

The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness has been selected as the 2012-13 Unitarian Universalist Association Common Read. In this remarkable book, civil rights advocate and litigator Michelle Alexander asserts that crime-fighting policies and systems in the U.S., such as the "war on drugs" and the incarceration system disproportionately and intentionally affect Americans of color. She describes multifaceted, lifelong discrimination and disenfranchisement that affect people who are branded "felon."

The <u>UUA Common Read</u> invites participants to read and discuss the same book in a given period of time. A Common Read can build community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversations.

A discussion guide to *The New Jim Crow* will be available online in October, 2012, to help Unitarian Universalist groups reflect on the book and consider together what steps they are called to take, as people of faith, in response to Alexander's call for awareness and action.
