An important milestone for us is our annual stewardship drive. The stewardship drive sets our budget for the coming year and it is very important for all of us to demonstrate our generosity by pledging to Second Unitarian, our favorite charity. Please make time to talk to your steward about the rewards you get from being a member of Second Unitarian and ask about programs you would like to see in the coming year. Spiritual education that helps provide meaning and resiliency is important to us all and brings us closer as a community.

Another exciting event is the Second Unitarian Live & Silent Auction on **April 11** to raise money to continue our work for this year. There will be many goods and services up for grabs, and this is an important community activity to bring us together and to showcase our talents. Please bring your friends to help out a good cause and introduce them to the great community that is Second Unitarian.

Spring is a time for new growth and growth is essential for a vibrant organization. The congregation has sought new space and a new location off and on for the past 20 years but has never fully committed to that goal. The Board, following a vote of the congregation in 2012, has assembled a group to lay the groundwork to determine the value of our current building. This will involve listing the church building for sale and to begin an active search for a new church home. A group has also been formed to submit a bank application for a line of credit if and when a suitable location is found. These are indeed exciting times and we hope the congregation is energized. We have spent a very long winter cocooned in our current building and it is time to take action to see if new space is available to enable the butterfly to spread its wings.

Finally, our interim ministry will end in the summer of '16 and we need to prepare for our next phase of ministry. The Board is investigating the possibility of securing a developmental minister for Fall 2016 once our wonderful interim minister, Frieda Gillespie, has finished her term. A number of recent *UU World* articles have discussed breakthrough congregations and one of the common denominators seems to be having a developmental minister. A developmental minister has a limited term and is hired to help the congregation reach a number of self-defined goals. As a community, we will need to define those goals prior to submitting an application this fall for the limited number of developmental ministers available.

On April 26, following the only service that day at 10:00 a.m., the Board will host a Town Hall meeting to discuss potential goals, developmental ministry, an update on the building search, and the vision for the year ahead. We hope you will join us for a lively discussion and a renewal of our community.

Treasurer's Report

February Income and Expenses

Expenses continued to be higher than income in February. To help meet March expenses the budgeted "take from reserves" of \$6,543 will be transferred into fiscal year 2014-2015.

Income came from Stewardship Campaign Pledges (\$9,937.00); Fundraising (\$279 – a pass-through for Build Your Own Theology workbooks); and Offering (\$654.86). No income has been received toward the \$8,000 budgeted for New Pledges from New Members this year; no income or new pledges were received toward the \$2,000 budgeted for New Pledges from Current Members this month.

We'll first use these capabilities at the Live & Silent Auction April 11, and will also accept credit cards for pledge and offering payments, other donations, and purchases such as fair trade products.

We selected PayPal as our credit card processor because of its record for maintaining credit card security and its good reputation with consumers. We will be able to accept Visa, MasterCard, and Discover as well as payments via personal PayPal accounts.

PRIVACY POLICY FOR CHURCH PUBLICATIONS

As stated in church policies: Respect for the privacy of members, friends, and visitors is a primary consideration. When newsletter submissions contain personal information (phone number, street address, email address, etc.), it is the author's responsibility to get the subject's permission to publish this information. Since many of our communications are transmitted electronically and information therein may more easily be re-transmitted, it's essential that any personal information be approved for inclusion.

In general, it's preferable to omit personal information, but in those cases where it's necessary (such as a location for an offsite meeting), those who submit articles should ask for permission to publish the personal information. An alternative is "Please call or email the church office for contact information." Contact the Office Administrator for more information.

CONGREGATIONAL COVENANT OF RIGHT RELATIONS Adopted May 23, 2010


To strengthen the bond of peace within and beyond the Second Unitarian Church of Omaha: We pledge

UUA Common Read Study Group Forming

Second Unitarian Social Justice is organizing a study group around Reclaiming Prophetic Witness by Paul Rasor. This book was selected by the Unitarian Universalist Association as the 2015 Common Read. A Discussion Guide produced by the UUA will provide the basis for a series of three 90-minute sessions. Dates for sessions will be announced and are targeted for summer months (June/July). Please contact Carol Johnson if you are interested in participating in this study group. Your input will be included in setting dates/times for the group. Books will cost \$12-\$15 per copy depending on number of participants.

Reclaiming Prophetic Witness points out a growing misconception that conservative Christianity is the only valid religious voice in our national social policy. The book includes insights from our liberal religious theological heritage that have bearing for us today, and calls us to prophetic, faith-based justice work.

Rasor explores the forces and tensions that have weakened our prophetic witness in the last quarter century. He also makes a strong case for the necessity of a liberal religious presence in the public square to complement and strengthen secular voices raised for social justice. Reclaiming Prophetic Witness offers new ways to think about how to remain culturally engaged and yet able to speak and act for justice from a faith-based position.

Common Read invites participants in UUA Congregations across the U.S. to read and discuss the same book in a given period of time. A Common Read can build community in congregations and the UUA by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversations.
