The Transition Team and I will be leading the Church Identity Workshop using processes which could be called, "Not your usual flip charts." We'd like to engage your right brain as well as your left in looking at what "**IDENTITY**" might mean relative to the church.

We all have multiple identities in our lives: mother/father, wife/husband, daughter/son, scuba diver, doctor, lawyer, farmer, dreamer, caregiver, artist, activist, Unitarian Universalist, cancer survivor/patient, etc., etc. Some are more important to us than others and some are more relevant to our lives at any point in time than others. All of them are useful and important.

The same is true of the **church's** identity. There is no one thing that makes Second Unitarian, Second Unitarian. No one quality, activity, historical event, person (living or dead). The church is made up of its members at any given time and their interests, AND it is imbued with the history of our faith and the church itself. It is also influenced and somewhat directed by the culture we live in, the city it is located in, and the ways we understand our role in the various communities we are part of. And so it can be quite daunting to describe the church's identity in any succinct sort of way.

So why try? Why should you come up with a clear, concise description of Second Unitarian? There are several reasons:

- 1. You want to reach people who may be seeking what you are offering.
- 2. You want prospective ministers to really 'get' who you are and thereby get the minister you want and need.
- 3. You want to invite potential partners in the Omaha community to engage with you.
- 4. You want to express your aspirations and inspire yourself and others to reach for more.

Three hours may not seem like enough time, but if you put your minds to it, you can create a clear, concise, real, and meaningful description of the church's identity — one that is your own, that you can be proud of. The Transition Team and I will lead you through some exercises to help in this effort.

What you do in the Church Identity Workshop will greatly enhance your experience. In order for this to be effective, we need you to come and participate. Bring your creativity, your perceptions, your experiences, and most of all your aspirations.

It has been a busy summer and I wonder: What happened to those days when church took a vacation and we all met up again at Water Communion?


The Board reelected me as chair, and Pat Caffrey was elected vice-chair to assume the chair position in 2016-17. Carol Johnson will serve as Secretary.

Treasurer's Report

June Income and Expenses

June expenses were higher than income but we finished fiscal year 2014-15 with an overage of \$6,789.22. This overage is due to unused Connections Coordinator Salary and staff Professional Expenses.

Careful stewardship from our committees and volunteers also contributed to the surplus. Committees only spent 57% of their budget. And despite several unforeseen and unbudgeted increases, General Expense, such as utilities and lawn care/snow removal, were kept to only 94% of budget. Some of these savings came from absorbing fundraising expenses into the Finance Committee, and kudos to the volunteers who stepped in to provide cleaning and childcare!

Since we had an overage for the end of the fiscal year, the Board decided to transfer money back into Reserves before closing in June. The following chart is before the transfer.

Income came from Stewardship Campaign Pledges (\$8,797.00); New Pledges from New Members (\$70.00); Gifts (\$100); and Offering (\$741.00). No income or new pledges were received toward the \$2,000 budgeted for new pledges from current members this month.

Stewardship Update

Our fiscal year ended June 30, and thanks to some belt-tightening, the year-end financials look good! Pledge income for 2014-15 was \$177,826, 96% of the \$184,544 budgeted. **Thank you** to all of you who paid your pledges, and special thanks to those members who exceeded their pledges! That helped compensate for members who couldn't fulfill their pledges because they moved away or suffered financial hardship. We ended the year with approximately \$6,800 as surplus but this gain was offset by funds that had been transferred from the Reserve Fund during the fiscal year

We go into the new fiscal year with pledges of \$183,174 from 80 households; this amount is 98% of our pledge goal of \$187,200. If you have not yet made your pledge for 2015-16, it's *not too late*. Email <u>stewardship@2uomaha.org</u> for a pledge form.

Last winter church expense was outpacing income, and the Finance Committee urged the board, staff, and committees to take action to cut expenses. Gary suggested that trash pickup and contract janitorial service be scheduled for every other week instead of weekly. These changes were made with an estimated annual savings of \$3,500. Building & Grounds volunteers are cleaning the church on those weekends the contractor doesn't clean. YRUU to Participate in 2015-16 IncluCity Program

The YRUU (Young Religious Unitarian Universalists) Youth Group is excited to announce its participation in the 2015-16 **IncluCity Program** through Inclusive Communities Omaha.

The IncluCity program works to reduce acts of school violence and bullying by challenging the assumptions, attitudes and beliefs around issues of difference (appearance, gender, race, faith, sexual orientation, ability, etc.). The program includes a full day workshop for youth and adults, a year-long internship program for two youth that will focus on putting the tenets of the Inclusive Communities program into action, and a 4-day Intensive Residential Program that will be held in Ashland in January.

This is a wonderful opportunity for our youth to learn skills to confront and challenge prejudice, bias and stereotypes and discover new ways to become allies for one another. The program has a significant cost and will require fundraising efforts by our group over the next 6 months. We will be publishing opportunities to support those fundraising efforts.
