May will be a big month in the life of Second Unitarian! As you know, we have submitted our application for a Developmental Minister and although the Search Team has not received any names of potential candidates, we expect that they will by the middle of May. This is not the timeline we thought we would have, but in talking with our contacts at Mid-America and at the UUA, the timeline was delayed to allow for a larger pool of candidates. This is good for us and we know it will be good for our future Developmental Minister.

The stewardship drive is wrapping up for next year and we have reached 99% of our pledge goal. Some lucky holdout will put us over the top and at our Annual Meeting on June 5th, a huge cheer will go up for the stewards of Second Unitarian; all those folks who made the commitment and pledged to make Second Unitarian financially sound and ready for greatness. Also in May, Omaha Gives! will take place on May 25th. This is a great opportunity for Second Unitarian because we are one of the churches that is participating and will be listed on the donation page. If you don't know what Omaha Gives! is, it is a way for nonprofit institutions to raise money and to compete for cash prizes for the number of donations received each hour and total. You can donate now but it is best to wait until that day because your donation will contribute to the total in the hour during which you give. This is important because our current year budget is running in the red because we have not brought in enough money from fundraising. Also, we have great news! As you may know, First Unitarian invited Barack Obama to speak at the centennial celebration of the First Unitarian building. Not to be outdone, Second Unitarian has invited the Pope to speak as a guest minister this summer and he has agreed but only if we build a confessional in the foyer. We also have to repair the parking lot so he can park his Pope-mobile close to the ramp. OK, the Pope stuff was just to see if you were reading carefully. I would love to hear from you if you get the joke.

One of the issues the board has wrestled with this year is committee leadership succession. As you know from our Bylaws, chairs are only allowed to serve for 3 years and then they must step down. Some of our committees, including Finance and Buildings and Grounds have a chairperson who has been in the job for 4 years because there is nobody to take his place. Clyde Anderson, the chair of both committees, who gives so much to our church, needs a break. I appeal to anyone who has an interest in being a steward for our church to step forward and volunteer to serve on one of these committees. Even if you know nothing about finance or house repair, this is a good opportunity to learn and play an important role in the church. One of the roles of the chair of each committee is to represent the committee at Program Council. Pat Caffrey has done a great job this year organizing the Council and increasing the interaction between committees. This is where the fun is in church work; interacting with fellow UUs and working toward a greater good. The Council is revising the Standing Rules with an eye towards turning them into a policy and procedure manual for each individual committee and not a ruling document owned by the board. This is all very important work and is contributing to what promises to be a very exciting May!

## Share the Plate May 2016

### *Whispering Roots*

One half of Second Unitarian's offering received in May will go to **Whispering Roots**. The goal of Whispering Roots is to provide fresh, locally grown, healthy food for socially and economically disadvantaged communities by using Aquaponics, Hydroponics and Urban Farming. Their re-circulating systems use 90% less water than traditional farming to grow pesticide-free, naturally grown produce. Whispering Roots also runs cutting edge school programs that teach the principles of Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (S.T.E.M.) by using "Hands On" experiential learning.

We value that we are a caring and connected church community. At the same time, we want to challenge ourselves to expand our horizons beyond simply community-building, and broaden our focus to bringing our values to life in the greater Omaha and larger community.

# ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM BUILDING & GROUNDS

## **Be Sure to Follow Building Lock-Up Procedure!**

If you are the last one to leave the building, please be sure to follow the Lock-up Procedure that is posted next to each exit:

1. Close Windows
2. Turn Off Lights
3. Make sure all exterior doors are locked - including the double doors in the Downstairs RE worship area.

To lock the keypad-entry locks, be sure the thumb-turn knob on the inside of the lock is in the horizontal position. After locking the front door, pull on the handle to be sure the door is latched and secure.

If you are part of a group leaving the church after a meeting or event, make sure there is a clear understanding who is taking responsibility for locking up.

## **...And be cautious in the Parking Lot.**

- ⇒ Don't leave valuables in your car in the parking lot.
- ⇒ Don't put items in your glove box or trunk after arriving in the parking lot.
- ⇒ If you see someone you don't recognize watching the parking lot or behaving in a suspicious manner when you arrive at church for Sunday service, please notify one of the greeters or the volunteer at the Visitors Desk.
- ⇒ If arriving or leaving after dark, please watch your step on the stairs and parking lot.
- ⇒ Please report any exterior lights not working to the Church Office.
- ⇒ If you enter the church during weekday business hours, please identify yourself to the Church Administrator. It can be creepy hearing someone walking around upstairs not knowing who it is!

## **Tornado season is upon us again!**

What if a severe storm with a possible tornado approaches our area during Sunday church service? Do you know our tornado evacuation plan? The safest area of the building is in the basement. Go down either north or south stairway. Proceed to the south classrooms area (under the foyer and First Hour areas) and stay away from the east-facing windows because the strong winds could blow debris through them. The windows on the west side are less dangerous because they are protected by window wells. The rest rooms, storeroom beyond the women's rest room and kitchen are also safe areas. Please stay clear of the RE Worship Area and Office which have large east-facing windows. Tornado shelter signs are posted as a reminder.

How do we tell a severe storm is close? There is a tornado siren about two blocks away, and we have a weather radio in the kitchen that will sound a loud alarm whenever the National Weather Service issues a weather warning for Douglas County.

I also encouraged teens to join covenant groups, and while only a few did, I heard amazing feedback about how much the adults loved hearing the teens' points of view.

My biggest involvement at church has been with the youth group -- not something I would have predicted, but there was a need, and I got hooked; I've been a fixture at Wednesday-night youth group for over a dozen years now. I've ferried teens across multiple states to youth conventions ("cons"), and can tell you exciting stories about getting lost in the woods and stranded in an ice storm (not on the same trip, thank goodness). I've been on the Youth-Adult Committee (YAC), the youth group's leadership team. And a few times, I've left my comfort zone and stepped up to do something or other that Had To Be Done -- often made possible only by the support of some of my dear friends from the congregation.

I've also been involved with the Our Whole Lives sexuality classes, as both member (Adult OWL) and facilitator (1st-2nd grade once, and 7th-9th grade three times). I particularly love leading the 7th-9th grade OWL class, because it's a chance to give teens knowledge that I wish I'd had at that age. (There's a whole session about how to ask people out. God, I could have used that.)

As a member of the board, I would bring an eclectic leadership background, my own unique way of seeing things, and strong connections with the youth -- all of which should make things interesting as we begin work with our developmental minister and try to figure out who we, as a church, want to be when we grow up.
