LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION



Summer is still holding on, but the kids are headed back to school, and our Sunday Church School will soon be in session. We are hoping that everyone enjoyed their summer but are ready to head back to the books and are ready to learn!

Classes will resume the first Sunday of September, the fourth, at 10 a.m. Registration will be available then. Registration helps us know your child better - allergies or medical conditions we need to be aware of, as well as any photo restrictions you might have.

Adults, please join us once or twice a month in the garden level as we explore learning about our world and our faith from a youthful perspective! We ask that all parents contribute time to this program and certainly welcome anyone who enjoys interacting with the young in body and mind.

We will have teacher training on Saturday, September 3rd at 9 a.m. in the lower level for intermediate and youth (grades 2 through 12) and at 10 a.m. for the Montessori Spirit Play classroom. From 10 am-10:30 there will overlapping information for both groups of people, therefore, training will take approximately an hour and a half. TREASURER'S REPORT

Treasurer's Report

In June our income was higher than our expenses. We finished fiscal year 2015-16 with a surplus of \$5,834.79. This surplus is due to unused Office Administrator Insurance Benefits and Professional Expenses; and the new Office Administrator is not yet eligible for Retirement benefits. Additional surplus came from unused pay for bookkeeping. Careful stewardship from our committees and volunteer hours also contributed to the surplus. Committees spent only 67% of their budget, a total savings of \$4,692.

The Board approved transferring \$5,734.79 of 2015-16 surplus to Reserves. Numbers here are before the transfer so you can see actual income and expenses.

Income came from Stewardship Campaign Pledges (\$11,871.00); New Pledges from Current Members (\$140.00); New Pledges from New Members (\$100.00); Fundraising (\$5,390.82); Offering (\$684.00). June Fundraising got a big boost from receipt of May Omaha Gives donations.

Expenses were from Salaries and Benefits (\$4,869.21); Minister's Compensation (\$8,330.79); Administrative Expenses (\$429.58); General Expenses (\$3,589.55); and Committee Expenses (\$568.17).

We Ended 2015-2016 With A Surplus!

Our fiscal year ended June 30th, and the year-end financials look very good! Pledge income was 98% of \$183,174, the pledged amount for 2015-2016. Thank you to all of you who paid your pledges, and special thanks to those members who exceeded their pledges! That helped compensate for members who couldn't fulfill their pledges because they moved away or suffered financial hardship. We ended the year with a \$5,835 surplus. Most of the surplus will be moved to the Reserve Fund for use as directed by the Board.



Letters were mailed to all households pledging for 2016-2017 thanking you for your pledges and stating the pledge amounts and schedules of payment. Please keep this letter with your financial records. If any information is in error, please notify Vicki Pratt, Treasurer, treasurer@u2omaha.org. If you selected to make your pledge payments via automatic deductions from your checking account, please check your bank statement to be sure the correct amount was deducted in July. 
Book Sale

Social Justice Movie Night

I Dream of an Omaha Where.... To put a human face on Omahans who have or still are participating in gangs and the people who have been tragically affected by gang violence, the Social Justice Committee will be showing a video featuring the stories of current and former gang members and victims of gang violence. Join us on Sunday evening August 28th for potluck meal at 5:30 (if you choose) and video "I Dream of an Omaha Where.." at 6:30. Bob Fischbach will lead a discussion after the video. Omaha has a long-standing problem with gangs and youth-on-youth violence and is one of the most dangerous cities to live in for African American youth. In order to directly address the devastating effects of gang violence in our community, a unique collaboration formed between the Rose Theater and Daniel Beaty, a nationally known performer who helps those affected by adversity tell their own stories of trauma, and through artistic expression, start their own personal healing process.



In April 2015, Daniel facilitated workshops of over 80 current and former gang members and victims of gang violence to tell their stories. He first created a play script based on the narratives that came out of the workshops. The play "I Dream of an Omaha Where..." is thought to be the first time that current and former gang members and victims of gang violence were brought together to share their experiences in this way. As part of the project, a videographer was hired to chronicle the workshops, rehearsals and the play. The full-length film shown on August 28th is that video.

The "I Dream" project was transformative experience for those sharing their stories and is changing the dialogue in Omaha about the nature and impact of gang violence.

Meditation Group

The Meditation Group meets on the third Wednesday of the month. We meet at 8:00 PM in the sanctuary following the choir rehearsal. At our meetings we have both a meditation-related discussion and an actual meditation. No previous meditation experience is necessary, and we love "drop-in" visitors or anyone curious about meditation. **Upcoming meetings will be on August 17 and September 21.**

Brush Up Nebraska Paint-A-Thon

Brush Up Nebraska Paint-A-Thon is a community based volunteer program that paints homes of qualified low-income elderly and low-income permanently disabled homeowners. It is in the spirit of an old fashioned "Barn Raising" that people come together to help others and brighten lives and homes within our community.

First Unitarian is partnering with Countryside Community Church and their assigned house is 4339 N. 38th St. owned by a woman in her late 70's. It is 1½ stories tall so we will need step ladders for much of the work, but also people to paint the lower portions including the foundation, and someone to deliver the donuts and juice. Children 16 and under will need a signed permission slip, and a designated adult on-site to keep an eye on them.

We need more volunteers! If you are unavailable on August 20th, there will be a "prep" day the Friday or Saturday before.

PRIVACY POLICY FOR CHURCH PUBLICATIONS

Church policy states: Respect for the privacy of members, friends, and visitors is a primary consideration. When newsletter submissions contain personal information (phone number, street address, email address, etc.), it is the author's responsibility to get the subject's permission to publish this information. Since many of our communications are transmitted electronically and information therein may more easily be re-transmitted, it's essential that any personal information be approved for inclusion.

What is that pile of rocks in the side yard?

If you said it was a cairn then pat yourself on the back. If you said it was a *peace cairn* then you really know your rocks... or your church history.

Vicki Pratt had this to report: "I went to a dance workshop in Berea, KY sometime between September 11 and the US invasion of Iraq. One the churches there had constructed a peace cairn. Some of their members were at the dance workshop and spoke about their cairn. They were giving away small rock "seeds" and asking other churches to also construct one on their grounds across the US and Canada."

Vicki had the "seed" for a while and it was talked about it at Social Justice meetings. But as we all know - there are great ideas and then there is putting those ideas into action! Just when Vicki had resigned herself to carrying that "seed" in her handbag forever (ok not really, but it sounds good, right?!), a young boy scout stepped forward!

Chris Alberts decided to construct the cairn for his Eagle Scout project. Meetings were held and votes took place and the peace cairn was approved! Chris managed fund raising, rock selection, planning, and recruiting volunteers to get the rocks, load them, get them to our church, and construct the cairn.
