We also hope to begin support groups; for instance, one for parents of children with autism or people who have retired and would like to get together. In the fall we will continue our Tuesday lunch hours, for anyone who would like to stop by. We hope to offer more social events, just plain fun because we all deserve some plain fun!

If you have thoughts or questions, my door (and e-mail inbox) is always open and I cannot wait to talk more about the work we have done this year as well as the work that awaits us. There is a world out there that desires a liberal faith, a faith that welcomes people and celebrates their lives rather than denies their experience. May we continue to be that faith and may we welcome more and more people into our church walls so that we may create justice and spiritual grounding for all!

Two Service Sundays to Begin September 11

On May 22, 2011, thirty-five years after Second Unitarian Church of Omaha was incorporated, we held a discussion regarding growth, at the congregation's Annual Meeting. As weekly attendance continues to increase, Rev. Scott McNeill engaged the congregation, various committees and individuals over the course of a year to discuss the different possibilities to maintain and encourage membership growth at Second Unitarian.

After a discussion of various possibilities (renting space, two services, making no changes), following a congregational survey and individual meetings, a member of the congregation made a motion to approve the beginning of two worship services starting in the Fall of 2011. The motion was seconded and approved 43-2.

As we head to the thirty-fifth anniversary of our congregation (our first members signed the membership book on July 25, 1976), we are moving toward an exciting potential for our church.

We will celebrate **Water Communion on September 4, 2011 at 10:30 a.m.** followed by our annual Ice Cream Social. On the **following Sunday** (**September 11, 2011**), we will proceed with two worship services on Sunday morning. In the months that follow, you will see opportunities to connect through potlucks and small group discussions.

In the winter of 2011/2012, Music and Worship, Membership, Fellowship and Religious Growth and Learning will evaluate how Sunday mornings are faring and if we need to make changes. At any point along the way, Rev. Scott welcomes feedback, knowing that the change will be difficult while we settle into a new way of being. Our tradition tells us that truth is forever unfolding, and as such, we will try to learn from whatever we try in the fall to make this congregation available for its members and those in the community who need our faith.

After reading through survey responses, talking with the pertinent committees and evaluating other congregation's success, we will adopt the following schedule in the fall. Please contact Rev. Scott McNeill if you have any questions and he will help answer them or direct you to the relevant parties.

9:30 a.m. Worship

Religious Education (Pre-Kindergarten, Kindergarten-1st grade, 2nd-6th grades)

10:30 a.m. Coffee Hour 11:30 a.m. Worship

Religious Education (Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten)

12:30 p.m. Adult Religious Education (previously, "First Hour")

Making this change is not an easy proposition for the staff, the leadership of the congregation or you, the members. We are incredibly lucky you are willing to sacrifice and work hard in order to strengthen the congregation and its potential for growth. Please take advantage of all of the opportunities to connect with one another as they arise, so that we may stay united as a caring community growing with and because of one another.

Minutes from the May 22, 2011, Annual Meeting

- 1. Call the Meeting to Order: Tom Peterson, Board Chair
- Opening Words and Chalice Lighting: Rev. Scott McNeill, Minister.
- 3. Confirmation of Quorum

OUTCOME: Lorraine Duggin, secretary, confirmed quorum. 6 absentee ballots, not counted to the quorum, were also received. A motion was also passed to amend the minutes from last year's meeting to the correct date of May 23, 2010.

4. Affirmation of Guidelines for Right Relationships

OUTCOME: Vote passed unanimously.

5. Presentation and election of slates of nominees.

Board of Trustees – Joanne Draper, Anita Jeck. All 3 year terms to replace Tom Peterson and Carol Johnson, who served their terms.

Endowment Fund Committee: Joel Haskins, taking Cy Leise's place (3 year term)

Nominations and Leadership Development: Richard Koelling, to replace Joanne Draper (3 year term)

OUTCOME: Steve Abraham presented the slate, which was moved for acceptance by Gene Kopecky and seconded by Janet Nichols. The slate was passed with 1 abstention.

6. Presentation and vote on annual budget for 2011-2012

OUTCOME: After a brief discussion, the vote passed unanimously

7. Approval of Delegates for General Assembly (3 allowed)

OUTCOME: Clyde Anderson moved and Darrell Draper seconded to elect Don Shennum as a delegate to the General Assembly in Charlotte, NC, in June and to permit the Board to name two other delegates. (Assuming that two other 2nd UU members are going and are willing to be delegates.) Outcome was unanimous.

8. Discuss Possibility of Moving to Two Sunday Services

OUTCOME: After considerable discussion following a presentation by Rev. McNeill, the congregation voted to approve the proposal with 43 approving, 2 opposing. Motion carried. Rev. McNeill added a friendly amendment to report back to the congregation by June 19 on the details of the two services format.

Do you have a favorite food or a favorite piece of music? Mindfulness is also called being "present" or being "in the moment." It's when your mind is gently focused on only one thing: what you are doing at that moment. When your mind is filled with anxiety or is thinking about several things at once, the ability to experience something fully is lost.

Surprisingly, you can take steps to greatly improve your ability to be mindful - through meditation, of course! Practicing to sit quietly and notice your breathing (and nothing but your breathing) trains your mind to have the same kind of mindful focus on the everyday things in life. Tornado season is upon us again!



What if a severe storm with a possible tornado approaches our area during Sunday church service? Do you know our tornado evacuation plan?

The safest area of the building is in the basement. Go down either north or south stairway. Proceed to the south classrooms area (under the foyer and First Hour areas) and stay away from the east-facing windows because the strong winds could blow debris through them. The windows on the west side are less dangerous because they are protected by window wells. The restrooms, storeroom beyond the women's restroom, and kitchen are also relatively safe areas. Please stay

clear of the RE Worship Area and Nursery which have large east-facing windows. Tornado shelter signs are posted as a reminder.

How do we tell a severe storm is close? There is a tornado siren about two blocks away, and we have a weather radio in the kitchen that will sound a loud alarm automatically whenever the National Weather Service issues a weather warning for Douglas County.
