Spring is here and it is time to do some cleaning and some reassessment. The church spring cleanup is scheduled for this month and what better way to meet new folks than working together on a small project at church. The stewardship campaign is winding down and soon it will be time for the board and the Finance Coordinating Council to 'clean up' our budget by examining our pledge total, make a guesstimate of how much other income will come in from new members after July, from building rentals and other fundraisers. This will establish our total income and then we will have to go through our expenses to determine how we can balance the budget. This is always a

difficult task because we want to provide committees with the means to create new programs but most of our budget is non-discretionary, such as salaries, utilities, insurance and supplies to keep the church running. Over the past few years we have taken money out of reserves (i.e. savings) in order to pay for operating expenses. Fixing the parking lot and developing new programs may have to wait unless we see a substantial increase in our pledges. I urge you, if at all possible, please increase your pledge by 5% so we can help the committees do what they need to do and keep our church building looking spiffy!

Towards the end of the month the board is hosting a Town Hall meeting designed to be informational and uplifting. One goal this year has been to help us all develop a better sense of our religious and church identity. We have done that through conversations and these meetings and we hope you will RSVP for our brand of democracy after church service on April 24. Committee chairs will discuss initiatives their committees are working on, we will hear from the Search Committee regarding their work and we will recognize some members who have made important contributions in the life of the church. Your vote is needed! Help Decide the Future of Your Church

Mark your calendars for Sunday, June 5, 2016 for our Annual Congregational Meeting. At least 35% of our membership must be present to conduct business on behalf of the congregation. We will adopt a budget for the upcoming church year, elect officers to lead the congregation and decide other important matters.

Second Unitarian by-laws state: "The right to vote at congregational meetings shall be extended only to persons who have been designated Members 60 days prior to the meeting. All contributions must be recorded within the past ten months preceding the 60-day cutoff date."

This year, persons signing the Membership Book prior to April 5th and any member making an attributable, recorded contribution toward their pledge between July 1, 2015 and April 5th will be eligible to vote on matters presented at the Annual Meeting. If you have questions about your eligibility, contact Carol Johnson.


Share Your Story

In February our income did not meet monthly expenses but we maintained a surplus for the year to date.

Income came from Stewardship Campaign Pledges (\$13,595.00); New Pledges from Current Members (\$140.00); New Pledges from New Members (\$470.00); Other Income (\$122.23); and Offering (\$937.00).

Expenses were from Salaries and Benefits (\$5,776.14); Minister's Compensation (\$6,734.31); Administrative Expenses (\$49.00); General Expenses (\$2,739.66); and Committee Expenses (\$722.05).

Social Justice Documentary Night: "The Powerbroker: Whitney Young's Fight for Civil Rights" by Vicki Pratt, Social Justice Committee

Hearing a lot about Wall Street vs Main Street in this election cycle? That tension has been around for decades. At the Social Justice Potluck and Documentary Night we'll find out how African American activist Whitney Young guided Presidents Kennedy, Johnson, and Nixon toward historic civil rights legislation and actions. By challenging America's business and political communities directly, Young made inroads blocked to other civil rights leaders.

This documentary and discussion is a follow-on to the talk by Russ Alberts during Sunday service. Young was the Executive Secretary for Omaha's Urban League in the early 1950s and attended First Unitarian Church here. He became the Urban League's national director in 1961 and received the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1968.


