## Minister's Musings

**On June 3**, we are having one of the most important conversations of the church year. At 4 p.m., we will have a meeting to discuss our Ministry With Children and what the program looks like and where it's heading.

We want to draw your attention to this because we need to invest time and energy into our ministry with children. Whether you have children or not, this community is built on having multiple generations grow and teach one another about their experiences – and so we are hoping that you will come (there will be food and fun activities).

Particularly, if you have had children come through the program, or if you are interested in how our faith will grow and stay strong for generations to come, we hope you will bring your insight and voice. We are hoping to strengthen the program by focusing on what Unitarian Universalism and our church is about (highlighting the words **Authenticity, Compassion**, and **Transformation** – just like our adult ministry).

Instead of relying on a model that just delivers information, we are hoping to encourage people to relate to the children through whatever means works best. By talking about our own lives, we can share the most important lessons – and so if you have interest in walking with our children as they grow, please join us on June 3.

Between that discussion and our church conversation about buildings and capital campaigns, there is much going on here that deals with growth.

What's important to me – and likely to many of you – is that our ministry maintains a high level of caring for one another. Part of what makes Second Unitarian great is our commitment to building strong relationships with members and visitors alike – and as we grow, we hope to strengthen that commitment.

My partner, the fantastic Rev. Sarah Gettie Burks, did her parish internship at All Souls Unitarian in Tulsa, Oklahoma, the largest parish ministry in the UUA. She can vouch for the fact that large churches do not mean isolation or loss of their ability to care for people. Instead, churches that grow give people more opportunities to get to know others, to grow, and to experience new events.

Personally, I don't particularly care how many members Second Unitarian has. We will never (in a way) have enough. I think that way because I understand that our faith, our message is one that this world needs. We could never be big enough to meet the needs of all the people who believe that truth is always unfolding, that religion is about connection, that we are meant to be our real selves, to care for one another and to keep changing.

As we grow, I want each person to remember that we are here for a purpose – which is to build a community that helps people be authentic, compassionate, and transformative. It may take time for that to sink in – but those values are the ones that pop up in conversation after conversation, worship after worship, meeting after meeting. People like our church and our faith because both encourage integrity and kindness and action.

As we begin May, I urge you to invite a friend to worship. Maybe the Celebration Sunday will speak to someone's needs, or the Animal Blessing. Whatever it is, we have some fun, interesting things happening at Second Unitarian and we are lucky to share that message with Omaha. So go forth, and share the good news – there is a church that encourages people to be themselves, to care for one another, and to change this world.

## Planks and Slivers from the Board

At the Stewardship kickoff event at the end of February, we lifted up the three words that are at the heart of the new mission statement for Second Unitarian: Authentic, Compassionate & Transformative. I have been a member here for over 30 years so Rev. Scott recently asked how this experience had been transformative for me. One of the problems of being "older" is that you can't always remember the sequence of influences in your life! When I first joined the church, the conversations of members – new and old - seemed focused on what they were not rather than what they were. I understand how wonderful it feels to finally find a faith tradition that lets you define your religious self, but eventually we have to transition from what we aren't to what we are.

The longer I was a member, the clearer it became to me that I wanted to exclaim the good news of Unitarian Universalism and not to just say what I didn't believe. That change in approach transformed how I talked about my beliefs everywhere. I no longer had a reticence about telling people I was Unitarian Universalist (just to avoid having them ask me what we believe); I wanted them to ask me. About this same time, I became involved with Omaha Together One Community (OTOC), a faith-based community organizing group. Working across denominational lines to achieve success on OTOC issues meant accepting that all religious beliefs are sustaining to those who believe. A few years later, this cross-denominational work put me in a place to apply for and accept a position in the ministry office of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas. I said at the time of my interview that we have similar beliefs on many justice issues even though we may get to them by different paths.

Nine years later, I am still working for the Sisters of Mercy and really enjoy being in a work culture where it is okay, and even encouraged, to express one's beliefs. I find myself saying, "In our tradition, we ......." Having these conversations challenges me to clarify what I believe and I am grateful for the opportunity. I wish this opportunity for you, wherever you are.

The Board and Committee on Ministry will utilize this feedback in their development of short and long-range plans for the future of our church.

#### **BILL KUHN**

## Board of Trustees, 3-year term

I feel that as a board member I will bring a perspective as someone who is somewhat new to our community, but sharing the views of many who are long-time members. As a new member, I still have much to learn on my journey and I look forward to continuing my growth at Second Unitarian. Our community is very important to me, and I want to see it grow and continue to be a refuge for those seeking to find community as I have.

While I do not feel that I will be able to assume a leadership position on the board at this time, I still feel I can add value and be a contributing member of the board, advocating for social justice and technology and acting as a liaison for these and other interests.

## MICHAEL LYNNE Board of Trustees, 3-year term

Although raised as a Presbyterian and confirmed as a Methodist, I have not been affiliated with a church during my adult life. Always a spiritual seeker, I practiced Transcendental Meditation and explored other spiritual traditions but have never found a spiritual "home." Second Unitarian Church is the first church where I have felt a shared spiritual and social justice mission that answers to my own needs. My work as a Worship Associate has been extremely satisfying, for which I am grateful. The sense of a communal mission, whether it be at the annual house painting, church cleanup, working on the Committee on Ministry for Rev. Sarah Gettie Burks, the hiring committee for the Director of Religious Education, or the Stewardship Kickoff Event Committee, has contributed to my own spiritual and social development. The people of 2U are its greatest asset. It has been a privilege and a continuing satisfaction to work with and get to know them better.

Obviously, a small church such as ours needs to continue to provide for the spiritual, social, and social justice needs and interests of its members by continuing to involve them in all aspects of church life. At the same time, we need to reach out to potential members in order to grow both in numbers and to enrich our spiritual and social ministry. An essential step in the long-term evolution of 2U must be to upgrade our current facility. It is inadequate for our current needs and blocks our ability to fulfill our mission and to attract and hold new members. At the same time the Board needs to maintain its tradition of prudent management of resources, monitoring of all aspects of church mission and functions, and adjusting programs, personnel, and priorities as necessary. It would be an honor to serve on the Board and assist in the continuation and development of this unique and precious institution.

## One a Day for the Month of May (a Random Act of Kindness, that is)

## Now It's Time to Budget

On behalf of the Stewardship Task Force, we want to thank you for your generosity to our church. As of April 19, we received 79 pledges totaling \$169,316. That averages to more than \$2,143 per pledging household! This is an 8% increase over last year which is a good response considering the depressed economy and financial stress many of our members are experiencing. We have once again demonstrated an exceptionally strong level of pledging in response to our deep commitment to our mission.

Since pledges are about \$9,000 below our \$178,000 pledge goal, the budget team and board made some tough decisions to achieve a balance between budgeted expenditures and anticipated income. Total Income = Total Expenses = \$201,416. Here's how we did it:

- On the income side we compensated for the lower pledge income by increasing new member pledges by \$1,000, allocating \$1,000 in accumulated interest income to operations, and allocating \$3,400 from the several committee funds to operations. However, the board felt that it was prudent to reduce the amount allocated from the reserve fund from \$5,000 to about \$1,400.
- On the expense side the following changes were made:
  - ◆ The new paid Membership Coordinator position was reduced from \$3,900 to \$2,600 by cutting the hours per week from 7.5 to 5.0.
  - The increase in the ministerial package was reduced by \$840.
  - Staff appreciation & development was cut by \$1,000 leaving \$250.
  - Office equipment & furniture was cut by \$700 leaving \$900.
  - ◆ General expenses were cut by \$1,300.
  - Committee expenses were cut by \$1,300.

## Tornado season is upon us again!



What if a severe storm with a possible tornado approaches our area during Sunday church service? **Do you know our tornado evacuation plan?** 

The safest area of the building is in the basement. Go down either north or south stairway. Proceed to the south classrooms area (under the foyer and library areas) and stay away from the larger east-facing windows because the strong winds could blow debris through them. The windows on the west side are less

dangerous because they are protected by window wells. The restrooms, storeroom beyond the women's restroom, and kitchen are also relatively safe areas. Please stay clear of the downstairs worship area and church office which have large east-facing windows. Tornado shelter signs are posted as a reminder.

How do we tell if a severe storm is close? There is a tornado siren about two blocks away, and we have a weather radio in the kitchen that will sound a loud alarm automatically whenever the National Weather Service issues a weather warning for Douglas County.

## **Peace Coffee News**



Our Peace Coffee supplier buys shade-grown beans directly from local farmers in Africa and Mexico. The coffee is organic and fair trade.

We just found out the packaging is being reduced from 16 ounces to 12 ounces. This impacts the coffee offered for sale by the Social Justice Coordinating Council. We now have 16-ounce bags, but when they are gone, the next order will be filled with 12-ounce bags.

The good news is that the 12-ounce bags cost less: Regular beans and ground: \$9, Decaf: \$10. Tea and chocolate pricing stays the same.

Proceeds from sales go to social justice outreach. You can buy organic and fair trade coffee, tea, and chocolate in the foyer between Sunday services.
