Minister's Musings

As the church year gets going again, and as we enter our third year of settled ministry, I thought this might be a good time to remind folks what a minister does! If something isn't covered in this, feel free to ask me! Here are some things I hear – and responses.

"Don't you only work an hour per week?"

Believe it or not, this has been said often. A minister's work is most public on Sunday mornings while leading worship. Still, it takes countless hours to prep for worship. Often when people ask me how long it took me to write a sermon, I answer, "All my life." It's not meant to be flippant – but a reminder that the work that goes into the sermons comes from life experiences of all kinds.

Writing the sermon is sometimes the least time consuming. Finding the right words for stories and meditations, finding the right music (thematically and emotionally) and on and on can take up time. Further – worship is just a small portion of my work. A sample calendar will be in a future newsletter.

"I didn't want to bother you - you have so much to do."

I came to this work because I wanted to journey with people. Having the privilege to listen to the stories and spiritual beliefs of the members here is one of the best gifts I receive – I truly, seriously, deeply mean that. Recently I did a memorial for a non-member and felt so absolutely touched that they let me into their lives. If you have something going on, give me a call or shoot me an email (or send me a text). If I can't be with you right then – I'll tell you. If I can – I will. If you just want me to know but not to do anything – let me know!

I feel very honored when you keep me in the loop about your family, pets, work, neighbors, etc. However, I also rely on *you* to tell me sometimes. At my best, I will remember that your aunt's son's neighbor's prom date has high blood pressure – but I'm not always at my best. I strongly believe that we're all adults and that if you have something you need me to know, you are responsible for letting me know! I will try to inquire about how you are (and when I ask – I *truly* want to know) – but please remember that at any moment, there are 130-140 members plus their kids and the visitors and the outside Omaha community and the UUA – and my own life! If I forget to ask – it's not personal.

"How can I reach you?"

I typically work an odd schedule that varies week to week, based on meetings and other work I need to do. Starting in September 2012, I will take off Mondays (although that may change some weeks, depending on meetings).

If you need to reach me and it's an emergency – call or text my home number (and definitely leave a voicemail if I don't answer). It's a local number and can reach me at any time.

If you need to reach me and it's not an emergency – call/text that number or email me at <u>minister@2uomaha.org</u>. I respond to emails a bit faster than I do calls because it's easier to multitask than call people. I hate that it's true – but it is. However, if you're a phone person – don't hesitate to call. If I can take the call, I will. If I'm busy, I will get back to you as soon as possible.

Ways that don't work very well at all include calling the church office (I check my voicemail there whenever I am in the office – but that can be hit or miss, especially over the weekend). Also, I am horrible at responding to Facebook messages. I know, I know – I'm young enough to be able to do it – but I just never really got into it.

In future newsletters, I'll have more updates on what a minister does, what his calendar is like, etc!

The Nebraska Humane Society's mission is to protect, save, and enrich the lives of animals in the communities they serve. The shelter was founded in 1875 and is the fifth oldest Humane Society in the United States! The organization was originally established for the protection of both animals and children. In the mid-1940's, state agencies began to embrace child welfare issues, leaving the Nebraska Humane Society as the sole organization within the Omaha area designated for the protection of animals. They provide education, give sanctuary to animals, encourage adoptions and promote responsible pet ownership. By providing animal control services to much of the metro area, they also serve the citizens of our community.


Writing for Spiritual Growth is back! After a brief hiatus, the long-running group will be returning starting Saturday, August 11.

Hungry for Change" Celebration

On June 5, the Hungry For Change discussion group shared healthy, delicious food as a celebration of their time together. Using the study guide from the Northwest Earth Institute entitled "Hungry For Change: Food, Ethics and Sustainability," the group had met monthly since January.

In addition to reading articles before each session, participants engaged in learning activities. As part of exploring health claims on packaged foods, participants described examples of misleading labeling or marketing gimmicks found on labels at the grocery store. At another session, participants selected a food and described positive or negative impacts it had on farm workers, animals, environment or health, e.g., impact of growing, harvesting, transporting, processing or packaging of the food.

Sometimes participants shared what they found to be the most startling information from the readings for that meeting. Slavery still exists in Florida on some lands, where workers in involuntary servitude pick tomatoes and oranges. The Coalition of Immokalee Workers is bringing this violation of human rights in U.S. agriculture to public light. Hundreds of thousands of children are purchased from their parents for a pittance, or outright stolen, then shipped to the Ivory Coast, where they are enslaved on cocoa farms. This chocolate is sold in grocery stores in the U.S.

One of the concluding articles compared the striking similarities between the current economic and ecological crises. Both involve indulgent over-consumption and a failure to consider the impacts on future generations. Sustainability is a key to both. For rainforest, oceans, and the global climate system, bailout programs will be costly---if they are possible at all.
