Minister's Musings

I make it a point to not disagree with wise theologians. Really, I find myself reading their words and trying to wrap my mind around them. Often, this is enlightening and leads me to a deeper understanding than I could achieve on my own. But occasionally I can never really connect their truths to mine.

One example comes from the great Howard Thurman. You've heard me use him a lot in worship; often his words comfort and challenge me. In a book on leadership for lay members, a UU minister quotes Thurman. Thurman said, "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive, and then do that thing. Because what the world needs is people who are alive."

I definitely agree with the great writer and social justice leader that this world needs people to be alive. In many ways, I see my role of minister as waking people up, reminding them to see the world around them. Discovering passion is a big part of that awakening, as is playing to our strengths. I'm a big believer in appreciative inquiry, the model of learning that says it's important to discover what we do well – and then to do that which we do well.

And yet... I also find myself longing not just to do the things I enjoy or things I am good at doing. Truthfully, life would be a lot more fun if I could only do the things I'd like, the things that make me come alive. But in the meantime, who would do the tasks that bring no one to life?

Part of me says that I should trust that they would be done – that the leaves would be raked or disintegrate, that the paperwork would get filled in or be trashed, that I wouldn't really have to eat my veggies if I didn't want to.

But truthfully, my heart and brain know better. They know that occasionally I am called on for sacrifice. It's rarely fun, though sometimes it does make me come alive even when I don't expect it to. And that's part of the mystery of life; life is rarely formulaic. Sometimes, even the things we know will be bad turn out to be good.

Therefore, I encourage you to find what makes you come alive. Spend much of your days doing that very thing. But I would suggest you also apportion some of your time for the things in life that are no fun. All work and no play may make Jack a dull boy; but, all play and no work means Jack will likely be a hungry boy.

Perhaps this all emanates from the season. November makes me think of sacrifice as our societal attention turns toward gratitude. Thankfulness and appreciation are important acts in our lives but we also need to remember that those things we are grateful for rarely come easily. Someone sacrificed – time, energy, money, lives even – for the things we hold most dear.

Often, I strive to find a balance (not that I achieve it with any regularity). Doing what feeds me, what makes me come alive lights a fire in my soul. And yet, tending the flame requires some mundane tasks every so often. If you can, find a way to keep your fire burning, regardless of the excitement of the task you perform. Then, you will be alive and awake to face the world and all its ups and downs.

Share the Plate for November: Wounded Warriors Family Support

One half of Second Unitarian's offering received in November will go to Wounded Warriors Family Support, Inc.

The mission of Wounded Warriors Family Support is to provide support to the families of those who have been wounded, injured, or killed during combat operations. The families of these casualties suffer in many ways: some financially, some psychologically. Wounded Warriors Family Support was started in response to needs recognized in Afghanistan. This mission is very much focused on the whole family.

Wounded Warriors Family Support is frequently called on to provide emergency aid for utility bills, groceries, or car repairs. They provide family-friendly retreats free of charge, giving young military families a chance to bond with their children, especially after their children were traumatized and adversely affected by a parent's wounds and injuries.

Strategic Planning Committee

The “mission” of the newly formed Strategic Planning Committee is to guide the creation of a plan that will help Second Unitarian Church be Authentic, Compassionate and Transformative in our lives, our work and our faith.

The committee is comprised of members Steve Abraham, Carol Johnson, Rich McArdle, Stephanie Peterson, Craig Piquette, and Rev. Scott. We are getting our “feet on the ground” by organizing ourselves as a committee and developing our projected work plan.

A recommended resource that is guiding the work of the committee is a book entitled *Holy Conversations: Strategic Planning as a Spiritual Practice for Congregations* written by Gil Rendle and Alice Mann. The operational definition of strategic planning offered in the book is: “a structured conversation about what a group of people believe they are called to be or to do.”

Three fundamental questions that rest at the heart of our strategic planning, as suggested in the book, are:

- **Who are we?** (the identity question)—we cannot approach a future that is not connected realistically to our past.
- **What are we called to do or be?** (the purpose question)—how are we to develop or mature? Our congregational mission calls us to be more authentic and more fully whole than we currently are.
- **Who is our neighbor?** (the contextual question)—where do we live in time and space. As a people of faith, we search within ourselves for growth and also reach out to others in service and invitation.

Please engage with any and all of us as we move through this planning process—we will need your input! We are all listed in the congregational directory so that you can reach us via phone and email as well as face to face.

They were both dressed in red dresses, one with a red velvet dress and hand muff and the other with just a soft red cotton dress, also with a hand muff. She handed me the dolls and said they were mine, a gift from one friend to another.

That's not the only gift she gave me that year. She joined us that year for Thanksgiving and then we joined her for her Thanksgiving. She was not kidding -- hundreds of folks all ages and they were her family, her friends. She ran the community kitchen at the shelter! That last gift she gave me was the real meaning of Thanksgiving -- a priceless gift from a very special friend.

Social Justice Movie Night November 11: 2012 UUA Ware Lecture

Please join the Social Justice Committee on **Sunday, November 11** for Social Justice Movie Night. This month, we will be showing the 2012 Unitarian Universalist Association General Assembly Ware Lecture by Maria Hinojosa entitled "Stories from the Frontlines of the New America: Detention, Deportation and the Power of Democratic Resistance."

The lecture will be shown at 6 p.m., preceded by an optional potluck dinner at 5:30—bring a dish to share.

The UUA will soon be publishing the initial draft of the Statement of Conscience on Immigration. This showing will help prepare us to react in an informed way to the draft.

Each year, a distinguished guest is invited to address the General Assembly as the Ware Lecturer, named for Harriet E. Ware who bequeathed \$5,000 in 1920 to the American Unitarian Association for its unrestricted use. Previous Ware Lecturers have included the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., Kurt Vonnegut, and poet Mary Oliver.

In this engaging and compelling lecture, Ms. Hinojosa describes what is hidden in plain sight in the detention and deportation of immigrants, both legal and not. She articulates concern not only for the treatment of these human beings, but for what this experience is doing to American citizens, their rights, due processes and the core values of a free American society.

For 25 years, Maria Hinojosa has helped tell America's untold stories and brought to light unsung heroes in America and abroad. She is the anchor and managing editor of NPR's Latino USA. During her eight years as a CNN correspondent Hinojosa took viewers into communities that had never been shown on television. Her investigative journalism presses the powerful for the truth while giving voice to lives and stories that illuminate the world we live in. Hinojosa has won top honors for her investigative work in journalism.
