



His friend's cholesterol was lowered to 196 and his health greatly improved.

Boruff Book of the Month: A Selection from the Macyl Boruff Memorial Library

This month, Rev. Scott McNeill picked A Language of Reverence, ed. by Dean Grodzins:

"A number of years ago, the president of the Unitarian Universalist Association (Rev. Bill Sinkford) made a comment in a speech or sermon one day. It wasn't necessarily meant to be well-known, but sure enough it spread like wildfire throughout the UU churches and peoples. He said that we, as a religious body, needed to struggle with and find, "a language of reverence." Most of the controversy dealt with whether or not he aimed to add the word "God" to our principles (God appeared in most Unitarian and Universalist statements of faith until 1961).

So, I recommend you read a book about [The] <u>Language of Reverence</u>. In it, feminists and humanists, theists and many more diverse people write about their relationship to that which is holy and its place in our churches. No definitive answer is found; yet, they all recommend that as Unitarian Universalists, we struggle with the question of how do we define and talk about the sacred in life."

2013 Prairie Star District Annual Conference

Rev. A crucial decision will be made at the Saturday Annual Business Meeting: whether to dissolve the Prairie Star District and re-form as the MidAmerica Region. The new region would be comprised of the current Prairie Star, Heartland, and Central Midwest Districts. Votes will be cast by congregation delegates.
