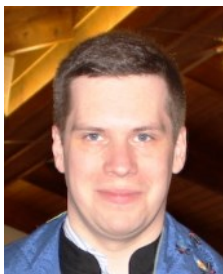

May is always a particularly busy month with holidays and graduations, along with the general joy of it being Spring and nice enough to be outside (well, okay – sometimes – who knows when it'll snow next). While you may have a lot going on, I want to update you on what's happening at the church and around town, and invite you to participate!

May 1 will host the first church meeting of the month, and it's appropriately Social Justice! May 1 is also May Day, both a celebration of Spring and of worker movements. What better time to encourage people to think about Caring for the Environment and Closing the Economic Gap!?

On **May 5**, Molly Kliment-Jenkins and the Religious Growth and Learning Committee will be talking with parents to celebrate the past year of classes and to plan for the summer and coming church year. This year, we were very privileged to have so many volunteers as teachers and guides for the children. If you can volunteer again (or for the first time) over the summer or next year, we'd be delighted and the children would be lucky to have you!

Saturday, **May 10** (the second Saturday of the month) is when the Writing for Spiritual Growth group meets. This group presented a fantastic worship in January (connecting to our theme of Creation), and offers a way to grow in your creativity.

May 13 is the second Tuesday, which is the day for the Retirees' Group – in May, they're learning about gardening with master gardener, Mary Anna Anderson!

On the next Saturday, I've been asked to speak on a panel about religion for youth who are gay, lesbian, bisexual, and/or transgender. The Nebraska LGBTQ+ Emerging Leaders Summit is hosting "Corn This Way" (what a great title!) for young people between the ages of 14-24. Over the past couple of years, I have been lucky enough to meet and work with fantastic leaders across Omaha and hope to use this conference as a way to connect with young people in Nebraska, letting them know about our religious tradition.

The main event of May takes place on Sunday, **May 18**. You'll read about it in other parts of the newsletter, but we cannot talk enough of how important it is for members to attend the congregation's Annual Meeting beginning at 1 p.m. This is an opportunity to connect with other members and to hear about our work in the past and help shape our work in the future.

After the Annual Meeting, we still have a full calendar – the Library Committee meets (**May 19**), both the Caring Committee and Worship Committee will meet (**May 20**), as does the Meditation Group (**May 22**). Each of these groups would love for people who are interested to check out the meetings or committees and help them continue their work for the church.

Believe it or not, this probably accounts for 50-66% of the programs we offer in May (and during most months). Each month, we balance a variety of programs – with monthly committees and small groups meeting regularly and other special programs, like Adult Religious Education classes. Spring brings a new energy to many of us, so it's a good time to jump in and work with a program of the church!

Board of Trustees

Pat Caffrey

A special thank you to all for being Second Unitarian Church! I joined you in November, 2005, and have served as a member and chair of the Social Justice Committee and OTOC leader, Auction Fundraiser co-chair, Treasurer, and member of the Committee on Ministry team. In April of this year, I participated in the Unitarian Universalist Association MidAmerica Regional Assembly in Topeka, KS, where I was reminded of one of the reasons for choosing to become a Unitarian Universalist -- the Hunger for Justice! My commitment to justice was sparked once again. It is my hope that we work together to build strong relationships, which is pivotal to a strong faith community, in order to carry out our mission within and beyond Second Unitarian Church.

Judy Eller *(final year of term vacated by Bill Kuhn; Judy was appointed for second year of term)*

I have always been Unitarian – I just didn't always know it! For many years I searched for a church home, a community of people who knew that there is not just one right religion. I knew there had to be other people who respected all religions and knew that you didn't have to recite a creed or be "saved" to be a good person. The first time I walked in the door at Second Unitarian I knew this was a place I could call my spiritual home. I signed the membership book in August of 2009 – it was a life-changing decision.

I have been actively involved in the Fellowship committee and have served as co-chair for 2 years. Fellowship provides an opportunity to serve others while fulfilling an important social function for our community. It is a ministry of giving, but what I get in return far outweighs what I give. When I was approached by the board to step in and finish a term on the board, I was honored and a little overwhelmed by the responsibility. I appreciate the confidence the board has placed in me. I have learned a lot about the workings of Second Unitarian and have great respect for the people who serve in a volunteer capacity as well as the salaried professionals who guide our community. I feel that my experience in public service (I have been a school teacher for 30 years), my experiences on the board for the past 7 months, and my commitment to Unitarianism make me a good candidate to continue to serve on the board.

Anita Meyer

My husband Gary Toth and I joined the church in 2002. Our son Alex was very young at that time and my first involvement at Second Unitarian was volunteering in the nursery. Since then I have taught religious education, been a committee member, served as a co-chair, and am currently chair of the Religious Growth and Learning Committee. I was co-chair during the initiation of Service Learning Projects where learning takes place once a month doing work for others outside of the classroom. During my position as co-chair, we transitioned from one director of religious education to our current interim DRE. I also serve on the Personnel Committee and was involved in creation of new personnel evaluation forms and determination of pay for our staff.

In my professional life I am a toxicologist for the Army Corps of Engineers and serve on various workgroups composed of Department of Defense Service representatives as well as workgroups composed of staff from various federal and state regulatory agencies. I lead a group of service toxicologists that reviews EPA toxicological reports and I work with EPA to resolve differences.

I am grateful for the opportunities I've had for personal and spiritual growth at Second Unitarian and also for the relationships I have here. I would be honored to serve our church on the Board of Trustees and especially in this first year of implementing the new strategic plan.

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Nominations and Leadership Development

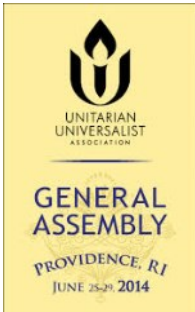

SAFETY FIRST: Building Lock-Up

Meditation Reincarnated

Our meetings are composed of two parts. First, we discuss a meditation/Buddhist related text, then we follow with an actual meditation. We discuss the text at the meeting by bringing up interesting points and asking questions of each other about the text. We also discuss any other miscellaneous meditation-related issues that anyone would like to bring up. We end the meeting with a group meditation, usually about 20 minutes or so in length. Sometimes it is a silent meditation, and sometimes we use meditation-related music or vocally guided meditation.

We have begun reading the book 10% Happier: How I Tamed the Voice in My Head, Reduced Stress Without Losing My Edge, and Found Self-Help That Actually Works--A True Story by Dan Harris. You can read the book ahead of time if you like, but it's not necessary. We'll read and discuss the book at our monthly meetings.

Meditation Reincarnated meets in the church downstairs on the fourth Thursday of each month at 7:45 p.m. to learn about and practice meditation. This group is designed for everyone, whether monk or beginner. No previous meditation experience is necessary, and we invite you to come and check us out. Our next meeting will be Thursday, May 22.



Stewardship Task Force Update

You Are Called Stewardship Campaign – Almost Done! Now It's Time to Budget

On March 31, our annual pledge drive ended, and the Budget Team* wants to update everyone on our progress. Our congregation has a history of incredible generosity, although this year has been a little different. As of April 23, we had 80 pledge units pledging a total of \$180,634. Not only is this way short of our \$195,479 goal, it is also less than last year's pledge total of \$181,841 from 88 households!

Many people are contributing significantly and with a generous spirit. We are extremely thankful that people pledge 3%, 6%, even 10% of their income – it is what keeps our ministry alive and thriving, offering Omaha a hopeful, vibrant religious community! However, for various reasons some members pledged less than last year or not at all.

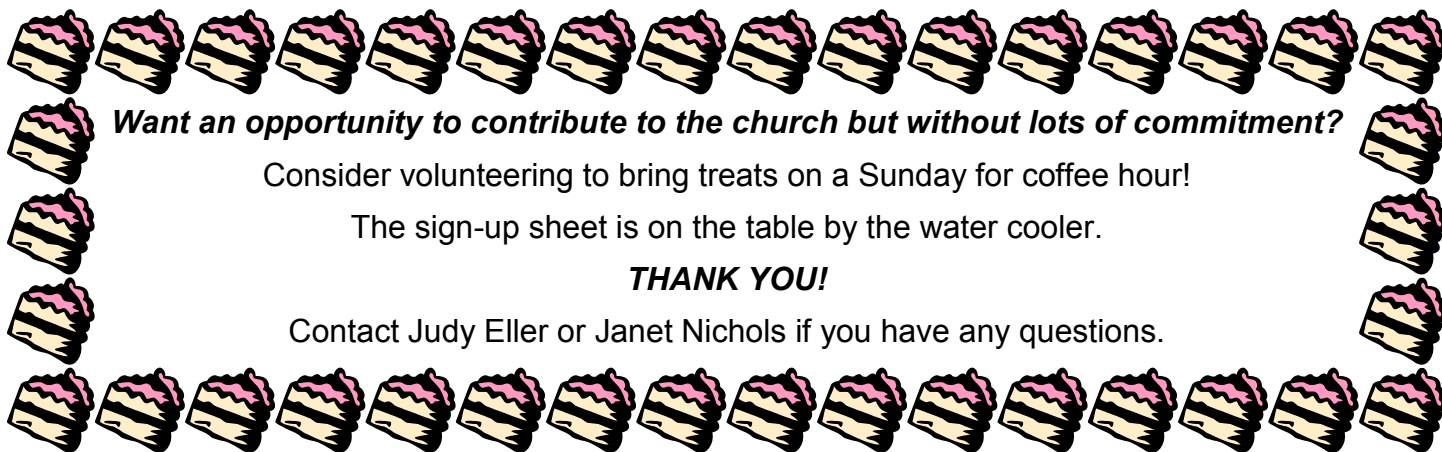
We provide excellent programming through the work of our volunteers and staff. Our commitment is to provide for programs that further the mission of the church and to pay our staff fair wages. However, our pledge income isn't enough to uphold this commitment next year.

The Budget Team meets April 30 to finalize the 2014-2015 Budget which will be presented at the Annual Meeting May 18 for congregational discussion and approval. Given the unavoidable increases in some expenses like utilities and insurance, it's obvious that we will be unable to fund any increases in wages and benefits for our minister and staff next year.

Help make our task easier! If you have not pledged yet, or if you are willing to increase your pledge, please consider doing so by May 9. Pledge forms are available in the gold pledge box in the back of the sanctuary, from the church office, or on the website under "Office Forms."

PRIVACY POLICY FOR CHURCH PUBLICATIONS

As stated in church policies: *Respect for the privacy of members, friends, and visitors is a primary consideration. When newsletter submissions contain personal information (phone number, street address, email address, etc.), it is the author's responsibility to get the subject's permission to publish this information.* Since many of our communications are transmitted electronically and information therein may more easily be re-transmitted, it's essential that any personal information be approved for inclusion.

In general, it's preferable to omit personal information, but in those cases where it's necessary (such as a location for an offsite meeting), those who submit articles should ask for permission to publish the personal information. An alternative is "Please call or email the church office for contact information." Contact the Office Administrator for more information.
