Meister Eckhart wrote,
"If the only prayer you said in your whole life was,
"Thank you,' that would suffice."

In a few weeks, you'll welcome Rev. Frieda Gillespie with wide open arms and eager minds and hearts, as you take the next step of your ministry. The next couple of years will be a reminder of the strength and generosity of the members and friends of Second Unitarian Church of Omaha, the people who make this place a community.

It's important to stop and speak of your gratitude before meals, which is why many people and families say grace together before they eat. Whatever words they choose, the intention is the same – it's a recognition that we benefit from our own hard work, and the hard work of many others. Each and every one of us has gifts to bring to the world, unique perspectives and insights and talents. By working together as a community, we grow as individuals and we grow the church. We are more than the sum of our individual parts. So, thank you!

Sarah Gettie and I will really miss you. When we chose to come to Omaha in 2010, we did so because we knew that the ministry at Second Unitarian (and the community of Omaha) offered great history and tremendous possibility. And now, Rev. Frieda will lead you along the journey; and then, it'll be someone else.

Some of you may have noticed in my worship services that I'd often use musicals for illustrations, even having one service each year that was based on a different show. In the musical, "Wicked," there is this song entitled, "For Good." While there are different arguments to be made about the quality of the music or the lyrics, this one particular image speaks to me – it's when the two friends (for the two characters become good friends) need to separate. Elphaba stops and realizes that she is, indeed, limited – and that Glinda must forge on and do the work Elphaba cannot do. She charges her friend and says that "now it's up to you for both of us, now it's up to you."

Thank you for the chance to work with you; and now, it's up to you.

Our fiscal year ended June 30, and the year-end financials look very good! Pledge income was 99% of \$181,841.00, the pledged amount for 2013-2014 and 87% of \$9,464.00, the new member pledges. **Thank you** to all of you who paid your pledges, and special thanks to those members who exceeded their pledges! That helped compensate for members who couldn't fulfill their pledges because they moved away or suffered financial hardship. We ended the year with a \$5,335 surplus that will be deposited in the Reserve Fund to help pay expenses in future years.

The Paint-A-Thon Is Back!

After a two-year break, First and Second Unitarian Churches of Omaha are again teaming up to participate in Brush-Up Nebraska's Paint-A-Thon! The two churches will partner with the Bemis Park Neighborhood Association under the leadership of Rob Warner.

Paint-A-Thon is a community partnership that recruits volunteers to paint the exteriors of homes for low income elderly and disabled homeowners. Paint-A-Thon organizes teams for the painting of the homes and provides the teams with a qualified homeowner.



Our assigned house is on North 41st Street just north of Pinkney St. We'll be there **Saturday, August 16**. We try to beat the heat by starting early. On Saturday we primarily paint, reattach the fixtures, and clean up.

Brush Up Nebraska furnishes the paint, and we provide the rest of the supplies. Volunteers are welcome to bring their favorite brushes, scrapers, etc. Although we have a few ladders, we always need more, especially long extension ladders. Bring work gloves and wear appropriate footwear -- no sandals or flip-flops! This project is an excellent opportunity

for students to get service-learning hours.

If you would like to help, contact Clyde Anderson. We also need volunteers to bring snacks, beverages, and lunch. Because this is a work site with hazardous tools and equipment, children must be 12 or older with a parent present to participate.

OTOC, Making Omaha a Better Place to Live

Second Unitarian Church is a founding member of OTOC (Omaha Together One Community). The congregations in this broad based community organization work together to improve the quality of life in Omaha. Here's a recap of recent work by a few of the Action Teams.

- Housing and Revitalization convinced our City Council to allocate \$1 million to demolish dangerous and vacant structures in neighborhoods. The team is now working to help set up an Omaha Land Bank to revitalize deteriorating areas of Omaha.
- Immigration Reform educates the public and our Congressional representatives about impacts to families caused by current policies.
- The emerging **Mental Health** team is researching ways to improve funding for mental health programs and services.
- The Environmental Sustainability team is working with OPPD to ensure follow through on their commitment to move to wind and solar energy generation and to stop burning coal at their North Omaha plant.

Action teams form in response to issues raised in relational meetings. This process of meeting, researching, defining solutions, and speaking with decision makers works in personal, congregational, and business life as well as community organizing.

In order to receive a code to the church, persons should belong to one of these categories: church staff, current board members, treasurer, chairs of church committees, youth program leaders, and janitorial service. If you don't qualify under one of those classifications but feel you need access to the church, please contact the Office Administrator.

Lifespan Religious Growth & Learning

In August, we in religious education are preparing for the launch of our fall curriculum. It's an exciting time, full of hope and enthusiasm for our children, youth, <u>and</u> adults. This year we hope that you find it a time filled with spiritual growth and engagement.

Here are some dates to be aware of:

- <u>Saturday, August 23</u>: Religious Education kickoff picnic (see below for further details)
- First week of September: Teacher trainings (subdivided by curriculum)
- <u>Sunday, September 14</u>: First Sunday of the new curriculums

Child Curriculum & Scheduling

Spirit Play Montessori - Through a Montessori-based UU curriculum, Spirit Play, that honors the age—old vehicle of religious socialization, the key elements are the prepared classroom environment and the teachers. These elements free the children to work at their own pace on their own issues, after an initial lesson or story, within a safe and sacred structure shepherded by two adults.

Signs of Our Faith - Our selected elementary curriculum engages children to explore ritual practices of our faith that remind us of our traits and values. Some of the rituals are enacted in the congregation. Some we conduct alone, or in our interactions with family, friends, and peers; others are offered to the wider world. This program helps children understand the abstract concept of a ritual by naming rituals as signs of our faith.

Heeding the Call - As a social justice curriculum, "Heeding the Call" explores linked oppressions in our society and encourages participants towards personal growth in values that counteract the marginalization of others. Workshops on empathy, courage, abundance, joy, and other qualities ask participants to recognize how these standards can be tools for justice. Additionally, the program includes more concrete tools, such as suggestions on being a good ally, and tips on the language of conflict resolution. This curriculum is offered to our middle as well as high schoolers.

Sunday Scheduling - All three levels will be provided at the 9:30 a.m. service. Spirit Play will be in the "rainbow" room, middle schoolers will be in the new "lounge" at the bottom of the stairs (by the built-in shelving unit), elementary will continue to be in the downstairs worship area. The green room will be flex for spirit play and middle school. Second service will likely just offer the elementary class.

Adult Education Programs

We have developed a five-year plan for our adult religious studies. If you are interested in leading or attending one of the programs listed below, please contact me or one of the RGL members. The programs we run will be dependent on interest and finding a leader. I will provide all the materials in advance to the leader as well as teaching support.

Build Your Own Theology - A 10-session class based on Richard Gilbert's book

Sources of our Faith: Humanism - Explore various humanist sources for a greater understanding of humanism. Feminist History

Holland Lecture Circle Discussion - looking for a moderator

Meditation Reincarnated

Our meetings are composed of two parts. First, we read and discuss a meditation/Buddhist related text, then we follow with an actual meditation. We discuss the text at the meeting by bringing up interesting points and asking questions of each other about the text. We also discuss any other miscellaneous meditation-related issues that anyone would like to bring up. We end the meeting with a group meditation, usually about 20 minutes or so in length. Sometimes it is a silent meditation, and sometimes we use meditation-related music or vocally guided meditation.

We have begun reading the book 10% Happier: How I Tamed the Voice in My Head, Reduced Stress Without Losing My Edge, and Found Self-Help That Actually Works--A True Story by Dan Harris. You can read the book ahead of time if you like, but it's not necessary. We'll read and discuss the book at our monthly meetings.

Meditation Reincarnated meets downstairs in the church on the fourth Thursday of each month at 7:45 p.m. to learn about and practice meditation. This group is designed for everyone, whether monk or beginner. No previous meditation experience is necessary, and we invite you to come and check us out.
