Planks and Slivers from the Board

Just when you thought Second Unitarian couldn't get more interesting, everything changes. Our congregation has now officially entered interim ministry as we transition to a new settled minister two years from now. **Our work for the next two years is to reexamine who we are and what are we called to do.** These questions are not only for us individually but also for the congregation. Rev. Frieda Gillespie will guide us as we strive to answer those questions and more. A Start-Up Workshop provided by the Unitarian Universalist Association and led by a UUA consultant is scheduled for **Saturday, October 11**, and all are welcome as we explore the purpose of interim ministry and begin on our tasks. One is to challenge past assumptions such as:

- Are we truly a welcoming congregation?
- Do visitors feel comfortable when they come to worship, and can they lay their burdens down and be comforted?
- Are all members of the congregation cared for, and do we create an environment in which lifespan education about what it means to be Unitarian Universalist becomes real?

In order to create the church we want to become, everyone must find his or her shared ministry: the gifts each one of us brings to the church that makes it welcoming and a place for everyone to grow and become our best selves.

Shared ministry is the focus of our Strategic Plan because we will not grow without it. The congregation depends on worship associates, the choir, and our greeters to help enrich our worship experience. New families and visitors depend on a vibrant religious education experience for their children so they will want to come back and learn more about Unitarian-Universalism. The church needs volunteers to pull weeds, take out the trash, and do some painting or repairs when needed. All of this is shared ministry and each of these tasks builds connections; with the church and with individuals. If you are experiencing shared ministry, you know you get more out of those experiences than you put in, and if you want to share that experience with others, then recruit a friend, whether new or old, to help him or her find a shared ministry. It is only through this giving of ourselves that each one of us will fulfill the mission of Second Unitarian, to be Authentic, Compassionate, and Transformative, in our lives, in our faith, and in the world.

Share the Plate for October: GLSEN Omaha

One half of Second Unitarian's offering received in October will go to GLSEN Omaha (Gay Lesbian Straight Education Network - Omaha Chapter). GLSEN Omaha supports lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and ally students, educators, and parents, and they provide professional development for future and current educators. Last year, they provided more than 30 hours of training to current and future educators and support to 17 Gay-Straight Alliances and more than 160 students. They co-hosted the first-ever statewide LGBTQ+ youth and young adult conference in Nebraska for students, educators and emerging leaders from across the state. During the 2014-15 school year, GLSEN Omaha will offer the first ever Safe Space summit for educators and more programs and services to students and educators in rural Nebraska. August Income and Expenses

In August we transferred \$6,297.97 from Reserves to general checking to cover expenses. We also transferred in a pledge prepayment that had been in our Money Market account. Both of these transfers are included as income in the chart below.



Meditation Reincarnated

Our meetings are composed of two parts. First, we read and discuss a meditation/Buddhist related text, then we follow with an actual meditation. We discuss the text at the meeting by bringing up interesting points and asking questions of each other about the text. We also discuss any other miscellaneous meditation-related issues that anyone would like to bring up. We end the meeting with a group meditation, usually about 20 minutes or so in length. Sometimes it is a silent meditation, and sometimes we use meditation-related music or vocally guided meditation.

We are currently reading and discussing the book *10% Happier: How I Tamed the Voice in My Head, Reduced Stress Without Losing My Edge, and Found Self-Help That Actually Works--A True Story* by Dan Harris. You can read the book ahead of time if you like, but it's not necessary. We'll read and discuss the book at our monthly meetings. It's a good and somewhat humorous story about a real-life meditation experience by someone living and working in a high-stress, rat-race type of environment.

Meditation Reincarnated meets downstairs in the church on the fourth Thursday of each month at 7:45 p.m. to learn about and practice meditation. This group is designed for everyone, whether monk or beginner. No previous meditation experience is necessary, and we invite you to come and check us out. Our next meeting will be **Thursday, October 23, at 7:45 p.m.**

Upcoming Service Learning Projects

We have a list of Service Learning Projects (SLPs) we are planning for the upcoming months. Remember, these are open to *everyone*, not just families or individuals involved with RE. It's your chance to reach out to the greater community and grow your own faith, too! Put your values into practice: join us at an upcoming SLP!

October 26: Potter's Field

Potter's Field in Omaha was part of a movement in the 1800s to find a burial place for individuals who could not afford a standard burial in a cemetery or who were not identified.

Omaha's Potter's Field is located in North Omaha, next to the historic Forest Lawn Cemetery. We will take our energy and curiosity to Potter's Field on Sunday, October 26, to provide maintenance, plant some bulbs and to learn about some of the amazing history that rests in both Potter's Field and Forest Lawn Cemetery.

We ask that participants show up around 10:30 a.m., wearing work clothes, work shoes, and gloves. If you have gardening tools (i.e., pruners, shovels, gas weed trimmers, trowels, etc.) or some bulbs you can spare (or maybe need to thin out), please bring those along!

Potter's Field is a little hard to find, although the directions there are easy. Take 680 to Hwy 75/Mormon Bridge Road. Head south to Young Street. Potter's Field is located on the north side of Forest Lawn (it's across the street from the second driveway on your left). There is an arched iron sign over the entrance - but you'll also see the cars! Parking is available on Young Street - simply pull off to the south side of the road. There is also parking available in Forest Lawn, but you will have to walk around the cemetery to access Potter's Field.

November 30: Pine Ridge Reservation

Coming in November: Native Americans saved the Pilgrims in 1621 – Isn't it time we really said *THANKS!* Our donations will go towards "Friends of Pine Ridge Reservation," whose goal is to inform others how to help provide resources to these organizations, and to donate in ways that help preserve and support the Lakota culture. December 28: Adopt-a-Family

Adopt-a-Family is our traditional SLP in December. Keep an eye out for the Solstice/Christmas tree with needed items by the family/families we have adopted. More details about the family and needs will be forthcoming!

OTOC: Find Out Where the Candidates Stand

Omaha Together One Community (OTOC) has organized two Candidates Accountability Sessions so voters can be informed about how candidates stand on issues that OTOC has identified as being of concern to families in Omaha. These issues correspond to Unitarian Universalist principles of the worth and dignity of every person, economic justice, use of the democratic process, and respect for the environment.

The session for **Nebraska Governor and Legislature** is **Monday, October 6, 7:00 p.m.** at First United Methodist Church, 69th and Cass in their newly remodeled commons area. Come find out how candidates stand on accepting federal money to expand Medicaid so that low income Nebraskans can have health insurance, drivers licenses for immigrants who have been approved by the federal government as Deferred Action for Early Childhood Arrival (DACA) status, and funding to improve mental health services.
