# FROM THE MINISTER

Beginnings

Dear Friends,

I hope you are all doing well.

Winter is indeed here, with its cold and snow and ice! We have passed the Winter Solstice and the days are growing longer. Though we might not notice it yet, by the end of January, we will!

Our monthly worship theme is BEGINNINGS. A new year is a time for new beginnings of many types. We might make some resolutions – or not! – about behaviors and habits in our lives. As the Board and I work to refine the goals for our shared Developmental ministry, we are anticipating new beginnings for this congregation. It is our shared hope that moving forward with Developmental ministry will bring about a culture change for this congregation that will move it to being 'unstuck' and to becoming vital, meaningful and powerful in the lives of our members and in the wider community.

This month will also mark the beginning of a new presidential administration for this country. As I and my colleagues have said since the election – there is much about which to be concerned. Activities and events since the election have only underscored those concerns, not reduced them. We are truly entering a time, as our UUA President the Reverend Peter Morales has said, of **sanctuary** and **resistance**. We must continue and become even more a sanctuary of hope, compassion and action for our members. We might also consider if we can become an **actual physical sanctuary** for those who may be in danger in the coming year – and who certainly are being threatened. To become an actual sanctuary is not a light or easy decision to make.

We must also stay active in **resistance**, being prepared to step forward into the public square in ways that we have not in the past. The worst thing we can do is assume that everything is going to be okay, when it definitely is NOT, or to normalize the behavior we are seeing from the president-elect.

Our services this month will address this theme of Beginnings in several ways. On January 1, we will hear about New Year's resolutions – are they what we need? Or is it more about being 'resolute,' a different thing altogether?

On January 15, in observance of Martin Luther King Day, I will speak to the Black Lives Matter Movement – a movement still in the beginning of its time and one that we as Unitarian Universalists are just beginning to join. Ah, the month of new beginnings and fresh starts.

Earlier last month, I participated in a conference call with other DREs. We commiserated about the challenges our congregations have been facing lately. Many of us have seen an influx of visitors who are seeking a place that lifts them up and supports their many diverse identities. We talked about creating multigenerational classrooms, finding ways to have interesting classes for adults and children.

As a UU, we know that learning never stops. That's why for the next few weeks we are trying a different way to RE: the multigenerational Miracles Curriculum. This curriculum is for EVERYONE, not just our younger members. With handson activities and stories from our UU sources, you will discover your own agency for miracle-making. Join us on Sundays at 10 a.m. in the garden level meeting space to discover, experience and express awe and wonder! Led by me with another facilitator (youth or adult). This truly is a class for ALL AGES! The eight sessions will be:



February 5, 12, 19, March 5, 12, 19, 26 and April 2.

Participants make a uniquely UU inquiry—a religious search which simultaneously embraces the awesome truth of a miracle's mystery and the "how and why" of rational explanation. Participants explore different kinds of miracles, from the awesome, ordered beauty of Earth and all life on it, to their own capacity to transform themselves and others to bring forth love and justice.

We are also looking for one youth or adult each Sunday to assist with the lesson. If you're interested, there is a paper sign up available on the Miracles bulletin board in the Meeting Space. Or check out the latest RE e-news for the online version. I will be managing the session, but I will need an extra set of hands.

In November we spent more than new income. But we have a year-to-date surplus to dip into.

Income came from Stewardship Campaign Pledges (\$13,798.01); New Pledges from Current Members (\$35.00); New Pledges from New Members (\$200.00); Fair Trade Fundraising (\$95.00); Offering (\$1,146.34).

Expenses were from Salaries and Benefits (\$5,478.79); Minister's Compensation (\$6,280.83); Administrative Expenses (\$208.15); General Expenses (\$4,229.55); and Committee Expenses (\$450.70).



Polish your musical talents (singing, dancing, etc.), poetry writing, recitation, and dramatic or humorous readings, or whatever you do.




This is your opportunity to perform at Second Unitarian's annual SING FOR YOUR SUPPER, this year on **Saturday, January 28.**
