FROM THE DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

As I write this, my family is packing for a trip. Although I feel as if things are finally (FINALLY) settling down in my life at home and work, I am still looking forward to the change of scenery. And I am looking forward to new experiences. (That said, if you try to call or text me, you may only get a picture of my feet in some sand and an ocean in the background).



And that's what being a UU is about. Learning. Exploring. Listening.

So, I'm going to introduce you to a fun little project that anyone of any age can enjoy. I call it *My Bowl of Nature Wonder*. If you don't have time or energy to explore the greater world, take a moment to explore the micro world.

We live in Omaha, so it's not as if we are living in a cement jungle, but if your life is anything like mine, there are few opportunities to just sit down with a leaf or a stone and look at it closely. To study it. Magnify it.

That's what this bowl is all about. I have a very special bowl... I think I picked it up at a garage sale, but it's handmade and worthy of close study by itself. Make the container something special. And get yourself a nice magnifying glass.



Place items in there that you may encounter often. And some one may rarely encounter. Here are some ideas for what to put in your bowl:

- Onion skin
- Horsetail grass is a weed. If you look closely to the seed head, the "tail" has little serrated edges. You can certainly feel them.
- There are bones where they can see the internal structure - that they are not solid all the way through. And that "weakness" makes them stronger.
- Different kinds of thread, yarn, twine
- Seashells whose patterns get more complex through magnification.
- Leaves with their varied vein patterns
- The different parts of a feather.
- Stones of different compositions - can you see fossils, crystals or air pockets?
- Geometry found in seed pods.

As you look at your items, think about the process that made them. Their function and how form follows. Play scientist or detective. It's a great way for you to quietly explore the world, and share the wonder with another person.

I know you'll be glad you did.

Church policy states: *Respect for the privacy of members, friends, and visitors is a primary consideration. When newsletter submissions contain personal information (phone number, street address, email address, etc.), it is the author's responsibility to get the subject's permission to publish this information.* Since many of our communications are transmitted electronically and information therein may more easily be re-transmitted, it's essential that any personal information be approved for inclusion.

In general, it's preferable to omit personal information, but in those cases where it's necessary (such as a location for an offsite meeting), those who submit articles should ask for permission to publish the personal information. An alternative is "Please call or email the church office for contact information." Contact the Office Administrator for more information. **Regarding published photographs:** If you do not want your photo published (including in the newsletter or on the website), please inform the Office Administrator in writing. Treasurer's Report of 2016-17 Operating Budget

In May we spent more than we brought in.

Net Over/Short	-\$ 770.42	+\$12,552.36

Income came from Stewardship Campaign Pledges (\$13,449.67); New Pledges from Current Members (\$30.00); New Pledges from New Members (\$1,003.33); Fundraising (\$36.02); Other Income (\$34.44); Offering (\$1,501.72).

Expenses were from Salaries and Benefits (\$5,456.94); Minister's Compensation (\$6,485.15); Administrative Expenses (\$351.40); General Expenses (\$3,580.01); and Committee Expenses (\$502.10).

Filling those pesky potholes Buildings & Grounds

The Pothole Team of the B&G Committee convened Saturday, June 10th to fill the large pothole in the south driveway that had developed this past winter next to the sidewalk. Although it is a temporary repair, it was necessary to avoid continued deterioration of the asphalt and possible breakage of the concrete sidewalk. Thanks to Rick Bell, Roger Nicolaisen, Tom Rundquist and Clyde Anderson for their volunteer labor, the cost of repairs was just \$130 for the asphalt patch material.

The Church landscape gardens need friends! Weeds keep invading the flower beds, and some of the not drought-resistant plants need watering during extended dry periods. There are some tools in the Garden Tool Crib on the west side of the Church. It's usually not locked. There is a plastic watering can that can easily be filled using the hose attached to our rain barrel. Mary Anna or Clyde Anderson can give you a quick briefing on identifying weeds.

July Share the Plate American Civil Liberties Union of Nebraska

The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) is our nation's guardian of liberty, working daily in courts, legislatures and communities to defend and preserve the individual rights and liberties that the United States Constitution and laws of Nebraska guarantee everyone in the Cornhusker state.

These rights include:

- Your First Amendment rights - freedom of speech, association and assembly; freedom of the press, and freedom of religion.
- Your right to equal protection under the law - protection against unlawful discrimination.
- Your right to due process - fair treatment by the government whenever the loss of your liberty or property is at stake.
- Your right to privacy - freedom from unwarranted government intrusion into your personal and private affairs.

The ACLU also works to extend rights to segments of our population that have traditionally been denied their rights, including people of color; women; lesbians, gay men, bisexuals and transgender people; prisoners; and people with disabilities.

Since 1966, passionate Nebraskans who champion civil liberties have ensured the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) is able to defend the fundamental rights of all Nebraskans. Nebraska is now home to over 4,000 ACLU financial supporters and over 15,000 activists who reside in every one of Nebraska's legislative districts.

Position Information and Skills:

- Primary performance instrument is a Steinway Grand piano (Organ competency not required)

- Sight reading and ability to follow direction
