In January, our income was higher than expenses – this is good news for building up a surplus to finish out our fiscal year on June 30.

Expenses were from Salaries and Benefits (\$5,306.88); Minister's Compensation (\$6,714.42); Administrative Expenses (\$83.88); General Expenses (\$5,132.09); and Committee Expenses (\$635.05).



Although we could move it to a different time, I'm concerned about finding one or more individuals who can facilitate the experience. Our volunteer pool is getting pretty tapped currently.

But that doesn't mean the end of Service Learning! On the contrary, I am thinking we will bring it back during the summer months as a few longer-term projects that all the classes work on together on Sundays. We have the opportunity to make a larger difference and focus on better learning, not just tackling a service project. If you have an idea or would like to facilitate one with the children and youth, please let me know! We have some ideas we'd like to try, but are always open to find more.

2016 Community Garden Plots Now Available By Larry Kurtz

The Community Garden committee is soliciting applications for the garden plots located north of the church. The plots are the same as last year: 8 feet by 8 feet, approximately. The expectations from growers are:

- 1. All crops are to be grown organically
- 2. There is a \$10 fee associated with each plot to reimburse the church for watering costs
- 3. Growers must be willing to share watering and other gardening responsibilities
- 4. Growers must sign a liability waiver and two gardening agreements to have access to the plots. There are 14 plots available with a limit of 2 plots per grower. If interested, contact Larry Kurtz to receive

an application. Any plots not assigned to members by March 31 will be made available to the wider community.
