The family invited us to a specially prepared Afghani dinner.

General Report	Omaha Together One Community (OTOC)  Clyde Anderson, Ruth Corwin and Deborah Jadhav co-chaired the 2022 Internal Contribution Campaign for OTOC and Second Unitarian members contributed \$1,092. Each year OTOC congregations conduct an internal contribution campaign where letters are sent to a targeted group of members in the congregation. The letters are signed by members of the OTOC Core Team of Second Unitarian Church.  Participated in OTOC Leadership Retreat in January 2023  Environmental Sustainability Team (ESAT) is led by Clyde Anderson. ESAT encouraged the City Council to implement a climate action plan, lobbied OPPD in collaboration with a north Omaha group to shut down coal plant, and, in June, ESAT transitioned to a new Beyond Plastics Team.  Vicki Pratt, Cheri Cody and Rev. Juniper Meadows joined the OTOC table for the Martin Luther King luncheon in January 2023.  Social Justice supported the OTOC auction by donating a basket. Deborah Jadhav and Ruth Corwin created the basket which sold for \$95.  Vicki Pratt serves as chair of the OTOC Finance Committee and Cheri Cody prepares the financials and is on the committee.  Open Arms Transgender Social Group (OATS)  Since meeting back in person, on average 10-12 people come to the monthly meetings, including families. (One family comes from Valley regularly.) Also, several folks came after meeting Rev. Juniper at the Capitol when she testified against the anti-trans legislation.  Most of the meetings have a support-group structure, though

visited Trans Stitchin,' a free community closet for transgender people.

• Included in the OATS budget are funds to provide food for the meetings and pizza is very popular.

#### **Renewing Welcoming Congregation Certification**

Tera Kirk is spearheading the activities required to renew our status as a Welcoming Congregation for LGBTQ+ people. So far, four of the five goals required by the Practices of Welcoming Renewal have been completed, and the fifth goal is at the halfway mark The Social Justice committee hosted a viewing and discussion of the 2012 documentary Pay It No Mind about trans activist Marsha P. Johnson. In collaboration with First Unitarian, a dinner was served and 18 participants attended.

#### **Legislative Activity**

• Pam Miller-Jenkins coordinated the congregation's participation in Decline to Sign (432.0rg) which worked to keep the Voting Rights constitutional amendment off the November 2022 ballot. Pam organized a training session for church members led by Mike Forsythe, Civic Nebraska, on communicating with legislators. In the end, the effort was unsuccessful but brought together many voting rights allies. The church had a voting rights banner on the north side of the church for several months.



• LB 626 – To restrict reproductive care access (dubbed the heartbeat bill)

Social Justice organized a lobbying trip to the Legislature to protest this legislation. The structure of the hearing prohibited attendance at the hearing. The proponents were given 3 hours at the beginning and opponents were not allowed to attend. The group did participate in a large rally in the rotunda. This was Rev. Meadows first trip, of many, to lobby the legislature.



### • Legislative Bills 574, 575 and 371- Transgender Rights & Drag Shows

Rev Meadows, along with other progressive clergy from Omaha, made several trips to testify at the legislature on transgender legislation to reject restrictions on access to care. Second U is lucky to have such a committed minister/role model.



#### • Separate Church and Hate

Following a contemptible resolution when the legislature broke their own rules to combine two different topics, the legislature combined the transgender care for minors bill with the abortion access bill and passed them with the 33 votes required. This action is currently facing legal action. In response, the social justice committee has a new banner.



#### **Social Justice Webpage**

Frequent visitor, Heidi Garvin, expressed interest in working on social justice and is offering her talents to help social justice better portray its vision and its work. Heidi has a first draft of a video that shows examples of the work over many years. She has also rewritten the narrative of Second U justice work and included a direct invitation to join in the mission.

#### **Community Garden**

As a service to members and neighbors, the church provides 14 plots in our community garden. Larry Kurtz manages the opening and closing of the garden as well as assigning and renting the garden plots. All garden plots were rented to a combination of members and others. Instructions for gardeners are posted in a weather-protected sign in the garden.

#### **Afghan Refugee Team**

This was a successful ministry, in collaboration with First Unitarian, and the committee now considers this complete. More details can be found in the Faith Connections report.

#### **UUA Announcements & Actions**

• Vicki Pratt monitors UUA announcements and actions for inclusion in our weekly enews which keeps the Second U members informed and also maintains a connection to our UUA.

#### Collaborations

- Social Justice organized participation in the Tri-Faith Community's United We Walk event in September 2022. Marketing and Communications (MAC) purchased and loaned "Side with Love" t-shirts to participants who didn't have their own.
- Social Justice continues to collaborate with Faith
   Connections. Two highlights were the Legacy Tour in north Omaha hosted by Preston Love and being scribes at the congregational

	meetings to learn about and discuss Article II.  Collaborated with First Unitarian and Unitarian Church of Lincoln to provide two gatherings to experience Beloved Community so we can bring it back to our respective congregations. Distributions from the Endowment Fund are not made unless the fair market value of the fund over the previous four (4) calendar quarters is at least \$250,000. As can be seen from the above summary, this threshold criterion has not been met. Consequently, the Endowment Fund Committee is currently not eligible to make withdrawals for distribution of approved uses.

#### 4. Approved 2022 Distribution to be Made in the Upcoming Weeks

Back in 2022, the EFC recommended approval of an Endowment Fund application submitted by the Finance Coordinating Council (FCC) requesting \$4,500.00 for partial payment toward replacing front and basement doors. The Board of Trustees approved the distribution amount. The distribution was approved by 2UU members at the annual meeting in June of 2022.

Shortly thereafter, a downturn in the market resulted in a drop in the fair market value of endowment funds. As such, the FCC agreed to wait for the \$4,500 distribution until such time market conditions were more favorable to sell the endowment's mutual fund shares at a higher price per share.

In response to recent increases in investment fund values, the Board of Trustees stated via email to the EFC (May 17, 2023) that it would now like to have the \$4,500 distributed to the FCC. During its May 19, 2023 meeting, the EFC agreed to make a withdrawal from the unrestricted UUCEF fund for distribution to the FCC. As of the date of this report, the withdrawal process has begun but has not been completed.

#### 5. Target an 80/20 Split in Invested Funds for the Endowment Fund

The Endowment Fund maintains an approximate investment split of 80% Vanguard Fund and 20% Unitarian Universalist Common Endowment Fund (UUCEF). Recent inquiries to former EFC members revealed this 80/20 split was arbitrarily decided upon when UUCEF investments were initially made. There is no formal policy or procedure that establishes the need for an 80/20 split.

#### 6. Recent Audit of the Endowment Fund:

An audit of the endowment fund is currently underway. The audit is being conducted by John Knape with support from Mark Siepker
